

HAGEMANN, FRAULEIN E.; was born in Hanover; educated in England. She took an active part in the political movement of women in London. Is a member of the "Somerville," the first woman's club in London; was for some years its Chairman of Committees. On her return to Germany took part in the movement for the higher education of women; founded in Wiesbaden, where she now resides, a branch of the International Abolitionist Federation, of which she is the President.

GRÄFIN SELMA VON DER GROBEN

GROBEN, GRÄFIN SELMA VON DER, eldest daughter of General der Kavallerie Graf Georg von der Gröben, was born in Potsdam, 1856. She spent her youth in her father's garrisons, and on his country place in West Prussia. After his death the family settled at Hanover. There she made the acquaintance of Fräulein Paula Müller, who won her for social work in the Deutsch Evangelischen Frauenbund. When the latter lady, a few months after, was elected President of the Deutsch Evangelischen Frauenbund, Gräfin Selma Gröben took her place as leader of the Ortsgruppe, Hanover.



DR. FRANZISKA TIBURTIUS

TIBURTIUS, DR. FRANZISKA; was born on the Island of Rügen in the Baltic. She studied medicine in Zürich, Switzerland, because, at that time, the German universities were not open to women. Dr. Tiburtius and Dr. Emilie Lehmus from South Germany were the first women to practice medicine in Germany, and for thirty-one years the former had an extensive practice in Berlin, which she resigned to younger hands two years ago. Since then her life has been spent in travel.

HERZ, FRAULEIN MARIE; was born in Dresden in 1879. From her sixth to fourteenth years she attended the higher board-school of her native town, and later passed through the five classes of the Royal Saxon Seminary for teachers in Dresden. Three years afterwards she took the final examination for board-school teachers. Since the autumn of 1907 she has been board-school teacher in Dresden.
