Foshay Confers With Bruce County. The power situation in Bruce County, which has been the subject of much controversy between the Ontario Hydro service and certain communities in the County, the Foshay power interests of Minneapolis, which controls the supply of power to other communities, and the subject of a conference between Premier Ferguson and W. E. Foshay, head of the Minneapolis company, today in the premier's office. The chairman of the Ontario Hydro, Mr. Foshay immediately after the conference, but neither the Premier nor Mr. McGrath nor Mr. Foshay would make a statement as to what transpired. It was reported that the conference had to do with the possible acquisition of the Hydro in the event neither side being able to arrive at a settlement which would end the present controversy.—Friday's Daily Star.

Bad Auto Collision. On Wednesday afternoon of last week as Messrs. Jacob and Albert Schetter of Carrick were returning home from a motor trip up the Elora road, they ran into what might have been a bad accident at Glintz's corner, where the Provincial Highway crosses the Elora road. As they were about to cross the corner, they were driven by a Mr. Reid of Kincardine, speeded across in front of them. Albert Schetter, who was driving, turned sharply to the right in the hope of avoiding a collision, but hit the car at the rear fender, upsetting and pretty badly demolishing it. The occupants of the coupe miraculously escaped injury. The Messrs. Schetter very promptly made a settlement with the owner of the damaged car by purchasing the outfit and all parties were well pleased that the results were not more serious.

Detour to Elora Road. When the Mildmay-Walkerton highway closes for the pavement, the Elora Road will be used as a detour on the Provincial Highway, has been instructed to look after the Elora road, and it is expected that a considerable amount of attention will have to be given this detour to keep it in shape to stand up under the heavy traffic to which it will be subjected.

Will Rebuild Power Dam. Mr. E. Witter, proprietor of the Mildmay grist mill, has now definitely decided to reconstruct the upper dam that was washed away on April 1st by the big flood. The contract for the concrete work has been awarded to L. H. Koenig & Co., who will commence the job next Monday. The flood gates will be built farther west, and it is expected that the new dam will be substantial enough to withstand all floods and freshets.

Want Crossing Protected. The serious accident which took place last Friday evening at the station railway crossing, has created an agitation for a crossing alarm bell at this dangerous place. A petition is to be circulated for signatures and it is hoped that a measure of protection will be granted. Owing to the tremendous volume of shipping done here, the railway yard is frequently filled with cars, which most entirely obstruct the view of those crossing the tracks.

Finished in Third Place. Godfrey Schuett, representing the Walkerton High School, was a contestant in the Western Ontario Schools Association track meet at London last Saturday. In the 220 yard dash, Godfrey, in a field of thirty contestants, finished in third place, and was pressing the winners at the tape. He made the distance in 24.45 seconds. Mr. McCamus, teacher in the high school, accompanied Godfrey to London, and was delighted with the splendid showing he made.

Richard Cronin Passes. Mr. Richard Cronin, who has been a resident of Mildmay about a year, passed away early on Wednesday morning of this week, after a month's illness with gall bladder trouble. Deceased had been a strong, healthy man until about four years ago, when he had an attack of this trouble, but he made a good recovery, and felt fine until three months ago, when he was again seized, and although all that medical aid could do was done for him, he gradually sank until he passed peacefully away on Wednesday morning. Mr. Cronin was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Timothy Cronin, natives of Ireland, and was born on the second concession of Culross on June 18th, 1883. He remained in that neighborhood until the spring of 1928, when he moved to Mildmay. He possessed a particularly bright and sociable disposition and was very intelligent and well posted on public affairs, and made friends of nearly every person he met. He was married to Caroline Eiler, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Matthew Eiler of Mildmay, and to them were born six sons and six daughters, of whom five sons and four daughters survive. Three sons, Joseph of Virginia, Ben of Detroit and Timothy of Mildmay, served in the World War, Joseph enlisting in the U. S. Army and Ben and Timothy with the Canadian forces. The only surviving sons are Joseph of West Virginia, Ben of Detroit, Timothy of Mildmay and Frank on the home-stand in Culross; and the daughters are Mrs. A. J. St. Marie of Mildmay, Mrs. Jos. Kenny of Kitchener, Mrs. Herb Foley of Formosa, and Miss Abbie Cronin of Hamilton. He is also survived by two brothers, Messrs. Michael and Edward Cronin of Detroit. The funeral will take place on Saturday morning, May 25, to the Mildmay R. C. Cemetery, the funeral services to be held at the Sacred Heart Church at nine o'clock. To the sorrowing widow, sons and daughters is extended the sincere sympathy of the whole community.

Abandoned Car Here. A Ford Coupe, with 1929 markers, registered in the name of Mrs. James Thompson of Brussels, was apparently abandoned here last week. The car was left at Chas. Netzke's corner, carefully parked against the fence, some time on Tuesday night of last week, and when no person came to remove or claim it, Constable Stiegler had it moved to his premises. It looks as though the machine was stolen and abandoned here, as it had no gas in it to proceed farther. Mrs. Thompson has been notified.

One Year for Theft. Henry Hoffele, of Deemerton, who pleaded guilty to entering Peter J. Kunkel's premises on the night of May 3rd, and stealing a set of harness and a copper boiler, was sentenced last Wednesday by Magistrate Walker, to a year determinate and six months indeterminate period in the Reformatory. In imposing this punishment the Magistrate intimated that the next thief from the Deemerton section who is convicted before him, may expect a term in penitentiary if the statutes permit him to inflict so severe a penalty.

Clifford Man Injured. Chas. Buhrow of Clifford, who drives a truck for the Paul Bergman Construction Company, was the victim of an accident here on Friday evening of last week, that might very easily have cost him his life. As he was crossing the railway tracks at the station, coming down town, in his Ford coupe, when the gravel train, which had been working in this section for some days, came south into the station yard. The train was moving at about eight miles per hour, but Buhrow did not see it until it was almost upon him, the view to the north being badly obstructed by freight cars. The motorist, in an effort to avoid a collision, turned his car south, and the driving wheel of the engine caught the machine and dragged it a distance of about 100 feet. At this point the switch proved an obstacle, and the car was overturned and crushed, and Mr. Buhrow was thrown out. He fell with his face on the rail, cutting and bruising his face badly. He was carried up to the Railway Hotel, and Dr. Carpenter was sent for. Upon examination, it was found that the unfortunate man had sustained a fracture of the hip, and was also hurt internally. He was removed to the Bruce County Hospital, where the fracture was reduced, and we learn that he is now resting easily, and doing as well as can be expected. The injured man is a son of Mr. Chas. Buhrow of Clifford, is a quiet, industrious young fellow, and this misfortune is deeply regretted. His Ford coupe is almost a complete wreck.

Joseph Strauss Passes. Very sad and sudden was the passing of Joseph Strauss of this village, which took place on Saturday morning at the General Hospital, Toronto. Deceased was a sufferer during the winter with the flu, which left him in a weakened condition. He was able to work steadily, however, until about five weeks ago, when he was seized with an acute form of anaemia. So rapid was his decline that the attending physician decided that if there was any means of saving his life, it was through blood transfusion. He was taken to the General Hospital at Toronto on Wednesday of last week, where specialists examined him, and they discovered that even a blood transfusion would not benefit the very acute and virulent form of the disease which held him in its deadly grip. He sank rapidly, and on Friday night he became delirious and he passed over to the great beyond at 10.15 on Saturday morning. Deceased was the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Philip Strauss of Mildmay and was born in Carrick township on August 1st, 1883. He is survived by his widow, who was formerly Miss Margaret Moore of Riversdale, and five young children. His remains were brought home from Toronto on Saturday night, and interred in the Mildmay R. C. Cemetery on Monday morning. The sorrowing family and relatives have the sincere sympathy of the entire community in their sad bereavement.



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
