HARTLAND, N. B., June 8.—A forest fire that has been causing much anxiety during the past few days this morning subjected to a terrible extent. That Redoubt (stream) has been quenched and a strong wind protects the village. The night was calm and the fire ceased to die down, and the wind veer to the northerly direction danger would still follow.
