Letters From 133rd Battalion, Now In England, Received.

Simcoe, Nov. 21.—It was our fortune last evening to come into possession, with permission to publish, what will be conceded to be a most ably-written and original account of the voyage of the 133rd and other units, written in diary style from day to day by a private of the unit. We believe it will be of general interest, and the first installment will be reproduced in The Courier tomorrow.

(From our own correspondent) Simcoe, Nov. 22.—Letters from the 133rd, transferred to outbound mail off the Isle of Man, reached town today. All speak of a comfortable passage with good accommodation and rations, and a rough sea for two days. As might have been expected, many of the boys had not ravenous appetites after passing out of the gulf. The signallers were on duty all the way over, communicating with other steamers along the route as well as over their own transport.

Mr. Sidney Jones of Charlotteville, has received a cable, stating that his son, Pte. Harry W. Jones of the 133rd is seriously ill with pneumonia at Moore's Barracks Hospital, Shorncliffe. This is the first name to appear in the casualty list of the 133rd since their departure overseas.

The British Canadian came out yesterday evening with a splendid "Norfolk Battalion" supplement and an overflow of illustrations throughout the body of the usual edition.

L. C. Gibson has returned to visit a sick sister.

Mrs. Arthur Jackson of Port Arthur, is visiting with her sister, Mrs. H. P. Innes.

Mr. J. McCauley has re-purchased the fruit farm which he sold to S. A. Sessenth for some \$27,000 last spring.

A movement is under way to get a brass band organized for the skating season at the rink. Mr. John Sutton is resting on his oars at present. The veteran bandmaster's instruments were almost all taken overseas with the 133rd, which unit seemed to have some difficulty in completing their outfit rather through lack of promptness in ordering than because of any lack of funds. It is now about two years since the advent on the scene of the famous Belgian calf, so called because it was singled out at a stock sale held by Drs. Burt and Eaid, and when put up for auction it was announced that the price received would be given to the Belgian Relief fund. The purchaser refused to take the animal away after paying for it and the calf was sold to a man who had a farm near the Point till light. It was real, and still the calf was there. It was decided to keep the animal till the close of the war and celebrate the advent of peace with a public barbecue. That was two years ago. The original owners have kept the animal and were in condition it would doubtless have been slaughtered for the Christmas market and sold to add funds for the prosecution of I.O.D.E. work. At the time the calf was to the front, most Simcoians expected the war to be over before this.

Simcoe, Nov. 24.—Mr. Harry Nelson, recently appointed bailiff, found the duties of the office not congenial to his temperament, and has sent in resignation. Capt. Gunning, a veteran above the allotted span, who volunteered to relieve an eligible and take his place as assistant at the East End Long Point light, was brought home a couple of days ago and is in a critical condition, from overwork and lack of proper nourishment, according to his physician. The captain has sailed the seven seas, and like a true tar, he stuck to the job; climbed the tower one hundred and more feet, thrice daily, and kept the lights bright, and did the coaling.

It was with considerable difficulty that his transfer to Dover was made for the lake was rough and he had to be carried a considerable distance and taken out to the tug in a skiff.



