

London, June 17—The British on the Belgian frontier now have the Prussians penned in between the River Lys, which forms the boundary, and the Ypres-Commines Canal. This, with the British line from Hollebeke to the frontier as the hypothenuse, makes an irregular triangle pointing east. The two sides, along the Lys to the canal are each about five miles long, and this portion of the British line hat a length of seven miles, constantly narrowing and encircling the Prus-Brantford, Ont., June 14, 1917.
