MISS BURLEIGH'S LECTURE

Miss Bertha Bennett Burleigh's lecture drew a crowded house in Pastime Hall on Friday evening, Mayor Yould presided. The lecture was illustrated throughout with views of Louvain Brussels and other parts of Belgium showing the wanton devastation and death in the trail of the German army. Miss Burleigh certainly had a wonderful experience in making her way through the German lines and German guards and her story but confirmed the stories already which have reached us of what terrible crimes the Germans have perpetrated without cause or reason on unfortified cities and innocent people. She is a forceful and interesting speaker and very frequently in her address her feelings became so intense that she electrified the audience by her indictment of the enemy.

Miss Lawson had charge of the lantern showing the views and the members of the Sister Susie Society had charge of doorkeepers ushers etc.

MEMORIAL SERVICE.

On Sunday evening the Baptist Church was prettily draped with flags and ornamented with plants etc., when Rev. A. W. West delivered the memorial service for Walter A. Brown of the 85th Batt. His remarks were full of pathos and yet with deep inspiration as he told of the work of this noble young soldier and his sacrifice. Special music was given by the choir including a solo by Miss Neary and the Last Post rendered on the coronet by Mr. Roy Walsh.

A pleasing incident was the unspoken presentation to the Church by Conductor and Mrs. William Clarke of a Church service flag the blue of the large flag surrounding a white centre upon which were forty six maple leaves representing the 46 enlistments from the Baptist church and congregation. Eight of those maple leaves had turned to Gold on the flag showing that eight out of that noble band including the one for whom the memorial service was held, had made the supreme sacrifice.

WILL BUILD 130 SHIPS ON GREAT LAKES.

Cleveland, Ohio, May 20—An agreement tantamount to a contract to build 130 vessels to cost approximately \$800,000 each and totalling about \$100,000, was reached here today between Charles M. Schwab, Director General of the Government's shipbuilding programme and Great Lakes shipbuilding companies.
