CHILDREN'S RIGHTS ON THE STREET.

City children have some rights to the streets that must be respected. Such, at least, is the effect of the decision recently handed down by Chancellor Boyd and Justices Ferguson and Robertson in the divisional court in the matter of the appeal by the plaintiff from the decision of Mrn. Justice Falconbridge in Ricketts vs. Town of Markdale, allowing the appeal. The action had been brought by the father of a 7-year-old boy who was fatally injured by timbers on which he was playing, slewing and rolling on him. It was admitted that the timbers had been negligently placed partly on the sidewalk, and that the damage accruing to the father through the death of his son amounted to \$400, but the trial judge found that the boy was guilty of contributory negligence in playing on the highway, and therefore dismissed the action.

The divisional court allowed the appeaf on the ground that the child had a right to play on the street, and ordered judgment entered for the father for the sum of \$400 and costs; the claim of the town against Ryan, the owner of the lumber, for indemnity was dismissed, their lordships finding that he was not responsible for the placing of the timbers.

Mr. Justice Robertson made the following observations in the course of his judgment: "The highway is pro bono publico, and so long as it is not obstructed unduly by the person using it, that person, whether adult or infant of tender years, has a right to the use of it, and should he or she be injured while so using it, by reason of it being out of repair, the municipality, whose duty it is to keep it in repair, is responsible for all damage "sustained by such person."

There are few judges more levelheaded, than Mr. Justice Robertson, and his judgments usually show good sound sense. Take this case, for instance. If people had no legal right to go on the street for amusement purposes nine-tenths of the population would be barred. While they do not all follow the recreation of playing on lumber piles, the great majorify go out for their own pleasure, whether it's to stroll, attend the theatre, make calls or do something else "business." And if Mr. Justice Falconbridge's decision had been allowed to stand where would the line have been drawn? If small children were excluded from playing on the streets, would be have allowed larger ones. and if so, what would the age limit be? Again, if he excluded larger ones, where would be drawn the line between youths and adults? It may not permit their children to play on the streets, but if they choose to do so, the streets are there for the public use, as Mr. Justice Robertson says and in the absence of any law properly defining the rights of infants, it seems hardly compatible with the the dignity of the high court of the province of Ontario to expect it to lay down nursery regulations in the mat-

PRACTICAL PROPOSALS FOR THE PREVENTION AND PUNISH-MENT OF POLITICAL CORRUPTION.

A, most important bill was introduced into the Legislature Friday afternoon by Mr. Whitney, leader of the Opposition. It is one to Mmend the Election Act, and provides that in every case the returning officer shalf be a resident of the electoral district. On the day of nomination the returning officer shall announce the names of the deputy returning officers. Each deputy return; ing officer shall be a resident of the polling sub-division in which he acts. The deputy returning officers shall be sworn in by the returning officer. The ballots shall be printed by the Queen's printer, and the numbered ballot shall be abolished. The ballots and the printed direction to voters shall be furnished by the returning officer to the deputy returning officers two days before the poll. Each poll clerk shall be a resident voter in the polling sub-division in which he acts Agents shall not be given certificates allowing them to vote in polling places other than where they reside. The oath of the deputy returning officer shall be taken by the returning offi cer. The returning officer is to attend the polling place half an hour before the opening of the poll, and shall count the ballots to be used in the presence of the candidates or agents, who shall be allowed to examine the same. The ballot box shall be placed on a table The returning officer shall give a statement of the result, whether requested to do so or not, and the candidates or agents shall be allowed to write their names across the flap of the envelopes after they have been sealed. The ballot boxes are to be delivered to the returning officer by the deputy or the poll clerk. The returning officer is empowered, when a deputy returning officer has failed to sign his return, to count the bal-

A recount may be had where the majority is not more than 100. Bribers, receivers of bribes; personators and persons who exercise undue influence to receive six months' imprisonment in addition to the money penalty of two hundred dollars. Persons who vote more than once are to suffer three months' imprisonment, in addition to a similar penalty. Then the most important change of all is the provision that where at an election trial the evidence shows corrupt practice or other illegal acts to have been committed, the persons shall be tried at once, and the judges are directed to to appoint counsel to prosecute them, either the county attorney or another counsel, to be named by the solicitor for the petitioner, or a counsel to be named by the court, and all counsel and witness fees to be paid by the Province. Returning officers and other persons altering or falsifying poll books to receive six months' imprisonment, in addition to a money penalty. This provision is made for the protection of witnesses who give evidence in good faith. The provi sions of the bill are far-reaching, and if adopted, will have a most beneficial effect, particularly that which instructs the judges to proceed at orce in the trials of persons accused of illegal acts of all kinds, and provides that unprejudiced counsel shall conduct the prosecutions.

Mr. Gibson, Attorney-General, stated that these proposal's of Mr. Whitney covered a number of matters with which he proposed to deal in a mea-sure which he was now preparing on the subject. So that with the Opposition and the Government both striwing for a good anti-corruption measure we ought to get one as nearly perfect as possible.
