It will be, however, next to impossible for the Boers to continue movements in the open field when Lord Roberts moves after putting his army in first class

Lord Roberts' Report Does Not Mention it.

Boers Say They Have Taken or Killed 1500 British in the Latest Fight-brabant's Colonials are Holding Their Own.

London, April 11.—A despatch to the Daily Mail from Brandfort, dated Sunday, says: Yesterday Gen. De Wet inflicted the third defeat of the British within a week at Meerkats fontein, killing and wounding 600. He

captured 900, with 12 wagons, losing five Boers killed and nine wounded. The Daily Muil also publishes the following, dated April 10, from Lorenzo Marquez: The Netherlands Railway Co. professes to have received a telegram reporting a Boer victory near Kroonstad, the Boers capturing 900 British. Commenting upon this the Daily Muil remarks: There is a Meerkatsfontein about eight and a half miles southeast of Kroonstad, but, if the report be true, this can hardly be the place.

The Daily News has the following from Pretoria, dated Monday, by way of Delagoa Bay: It is officially an nounced that a battle has been fought south of Brandfort, in which 600 British troops were killed and wounded and 800 taken prisoners. Lord Roberts is declared to be finding great difficulty owing to scarcity of water.

LORD ROBERTS' REPORT

London, April 11.-Gen. Roberts wires the war office the following from Bloemfontein under date of April 10th: The enemy has been very active in the past few days. One commando on the north bank of the Orange River near Aliwal North. Another isattacking Wepener, where the garrison is grandly resisting it, and has inflicted serious loss on the enemy.

Despatches from Pretoria, as late as Monday, did not mention any further Boer victory. On the contrary they and, as Lord Roberts has hitherto never failed promptly to report misences, as well as successes, or to llow the newspaper correspondents to report them, until some confirmation s received there is justification for regarding the Meerkatsfontein rumor only an exaggerated account of ddersburg affair. At the time, Boer reports have so often prov-

ed correct that the greatest anxiety will be felt. No further news has been received of fighting either at Wepener or in Natal. Boer reports seem to indicate that Lord Methuen is advancing from

Boshof towards Hoopstad. It is a bold and apparently a dangerous move, since although it turns the right flank of the Boer position at Brandfirt, it puts Lord Methuen's orce between whatever garrison there may be at Bloemhof in the Transvaal, and the Brandfort force.

The Boer peace commissioners at Na-ples do not conceal the fact that they have no hope of obtaining peace with independence for the republics, but they will endeavor to save their amour further negotiations.

A Zwart Kopfontein, Orange Free State despatch, dated Monday, April 9, says: Lord Methuen's force is en-camped here, 10 miles east of Boshof. Since the Bishof affair Lord Chesham with Yeomanry and the Kimberley

with Yeomanry and the Kimberley Mounted corps has reconnoitered east ward, but he only encountered a small body of Boers, who fled.

The Daily Mail has the following from Ludy Surah Wilson, dated Mafeking, March 30:—"Colonel Plumer's column is now within twenty miles of us, but its advent is undesirable, unless accompanied by food supplies. The opinion prevails that, young Crouje has returned to the ranks of the investing Boers and is trying, to avenge Paardeberg." Lieut, Milligan, of Col, Plumer's column, is a prisoner in the hands of the Boers.
