

3000 PERISH IN EARTHQUAKE

Latest Estimate Of Number Of Valparaiso **Victims**

60,000 ARE HOMELESS

Valparaiso, Aug. 22.—The loss of life

Valparaiso, Aug. 22.—The loss of life by the earthquake of Thursday, Aug. 16, probably will not be short of 3,000, while the property destroyed is estimated at \$1,000,000,000, and possibly is far in excess of that sum.

60,000 Homeless.

London, Aug. 22.—A cable despatch from Chill yesterday afterneon says that a conservative estimate places the number of homeless people at 60,000 and adds that the distress is increasing. The bankers here of Huth & Co., an important house of Valparaiso, have received the following cable despatch from that port:

"The town, from Victoria square east to Brazil avenue, is completely destroyed. The commercial portion suffered less. It is premature to estimate the damage done. A rough estimate places the number of killed at 3,000. In our opinion the damage done by the earthquake here exceeds the damage done by the fire. Santiago, apparently, suffered much less."

More Earth Shocks.

Lima, Peru, Aug. 22.—There was another heavy earthquake shock at Valparaiso Monday night.
According to the latest reports received here from the scene of the earthquake, the Town of Quillota (situated here: 2 miles from Valparaiso, and about 26 miles from Valparaiso, and having a population of some ten thous-and souls), has been completely destroyed.

Modern Houses Are Unsafe.

Santiago, Chili, Aug. 22.—Only now can the seriousness of the catastrophe begin to be appreciated. The greater part of the modern houses here are unsafe for habitation, and the authorities have organized a special corps to pull down the tottering buildings. It is not safe to walk in most of the streets owing to the falling debris.

FIRE FIEND

Town Of Haileyburg Swept By Disastrous Fire Yesterday

LOSS IS A HEAVY ONE

Halleybury, Aug. 22.—The fourness portion of the Town of Halleybury was practically wiped out by a fire of incendiary origin at an early hour yesterday morning. The fire started in the McCabe Building in the centre of the business district. The loss is estimated at \$150,000. Over twenty business places and ten residences were gutted. The main business places burned were:

No lives Were Lost.

No lives were lost. Two persons were rescued with difficulty from the third storey of the Maple Leaf Hotel. Sam Singlehurst, mining expert, was found in his room in The Haileyburian building two hours after the fire began, and if the original intention of showing up the building had been carried out, undoubtedly he would have been killed.

There is no doubt of the origin of the conflagration. Dr. Jackson extinguished a fire in a box of shavings under the McCabe Building at 11 o'clock last night, but it is evident the incendiary returned later and restarted the fire. The flames spread rapidly to the premises of Budd & Ramshaw, and E. & S. Atkinson, and from there crossed the street to the Hudson Bay Co.'s ed the store.

Fire Engine Useless.

The fire-fighting appliances of the town were practically useless. The gasoline engine would not work, and aid was called from New Liskeard a steamer and company arriving from that town at 7.15. With the assistance of the Liskeard brigade, the fire was stopped at Broadway.

It is a sad blow to the town, but a determination expessed on all sides to rebuild on a more substantial basis. The town's growth may be retarded, but it will not be stopped.
