Dr. A. W. Thornton Speaks Out to Public and High School Teachers

Instructors Should Consider Health of the Children and School Law An Excellent Lecture

The ham's foremost educationists. The doctor gave an excellent lecture, showing that he has given the subject of education much deep thought and study. He is an ex-Public school teacher himself and now occupies the position of a professor in the Torouto Dental College. His lecture was greatly appreciated and was the source of much valuable information and instruction for the teacher. The doctor spoke about the duties of a teacher as viewed from four

of a teacher as viewed from four of a teacher as viewed arous standpoints—the teacher's, the perent's, the trustees' and the college lecturer's. He advised the teachers lecturer's. He advised the teacher to read widely and strive against be

or more desirable than that of the teacher," said he. "I would not place a teacher even second to the man in the pulpit. A faithful, conscientious school teacher can do almost

tious school teacher can do almost as much good as a man who proclaims the gospel. The teacher has the minds when they are young and plastic and the impressions they make are lasting."

He arged that education existed to fit men and women for the duties and responsibilities of life, and the teacher should strive to attain to his own full stature—to be the best that it is possible for him to be.

He compared the teacher who exercises corporal punishment to a slave cises corporal punishment to a slave driver and said that this mode of punishment only tended to lower the profession of teaching. Solomon has said, "spare the rod—spoil the child," but Solomon lived 3,000 years ago and the world has made rapid progress and advancement since his day. During his talk the doctor illustrated his method of teaching literature by giving a couple of excellent readings from the first and third books.

Dr. Thornton was given a hearty vote of thanks, which he appropriate-ly acknowledged.
