Apple shipment for the season of 1914 up to March 31st, totaled 973,322 barrels and 21,595 boxes. Of these 713,664 barrels and 11,198 boxes were sent to Europe, 8,524 barrels and 7,710 boxes found a market in South America, 1,621 barrels and 2,687 boxes went to South Africa, 97 barrels went to the West Indies, 14,979 to Newfoundland, and 5,533 to Boston. Western Canada took 116,023 barrels and the Maritime Provinces markets 112,000.—Barwick Register.
