Apple shipment for the season of 1914-15, up to March 31st, totaled 973,322 barrels and 21,595 boxes. Of these 713,664 barrels and 11,198 boxes were sent to Europe, 8,524 barrels and 7,710 boxes found a market in South America, 1,621 barrels and 2,687 boxes went to South Africa, 957 barrels went to the West Indies, 14,979 to Newfoundland, and 5,533 to Boston. Western Canada took 116,023 barrels and the Maritime Provinces markets 112,000.—Barrick Register.

Obituary.

JOHN WILEY CHURCHILL.

Mr. John Wiley Churchill, of Hantsport, died at his home, 'The Cedars,' last Saturday morning, at 10 o'clock. The passing away of the deceased removes from Hantsport one of its most prominent and influential citizens, whose place can never be filled.

Mr. Churchill had been confined to his home for the past year through illness, and for months past has been unable to leave his bed. A week before his death he contracted pneumonia, from which he never rallied, each day growing a little weaker, 'till the end came peacefully.

Mr. Churchill was first married to Miss Eunice Burgess, Kingston, N.S., who lived only a short time after marriage. About 40 years ago Mr. Churchill married Miss Mary Messenger, of Kingston. The members of the family are—Laura, (Mrs. W. Rice, Sydney, C. B.), Wiley, Fred, Violet and Gordon. A brother, Mr. George Churchill, died about eight years ago. The sisters are, Mrs. Schoff, Toronto; Mrs. J. B. Black, Windsor; Mrs. Gideon Reid and Mrs. John Woolaver, Hantsport.

Mr. Churchill's father, Mr. Ezra Churchill, was one of the pioneer shipbuilders of Hants county. At his death his two sons, John and George, continued his business, styling themselves E. Churchill & Sons. Until about twenty-five years ago, shipbuilding was the leading industry in Hantsport.

Mr. Churchill resided in the old homestead until he was married. The place is now occupied by Mr. Wm. Pearson.

His late home, 'The Cedars,' is a beautiful spot, and it was the greatest pleasure to Mr. Churchill to have his friends visit him and show them the place.

Funeral services were held at 10 o'clock on Sunday morning, April 12th, at 10 o'clock, at the residence of Mr. Wm. Pearson.

The interment was in the cemetery at Hantsport.
