HARTLAND WINS AT FREDERICTON

Score at Exhibition Game was 7 to 4 in Favor of Our Team

Hartland Ball team added still another game to their credit at Fredericton last week. They defeated the best aggregation that could be got together there in a score of 7 to 4. Of the game The Gleaner says:

There was no scoring in the first four innings, but Hartland opened up in the first of the fifth when "Jap" MacGibbon knocked out a nice three-bagger, scoring Stevens, who was on first base. MacGibbon scored on Ward's single and before three were out Ward and DeWitt scored.

Fredericton made a good attempt to even things up in their half of the inning, but succeeded in getting only three men across the plate. Hartland scored two runs in the sixth and another in the seventh, and Fredericton scored one in the ninth.

"Jap" MacGibbon pitched a good, steady game for Hartland, allowing only a few scattered hits and having eleven strikeouts. Harry Wheeler pitched well for the local team until the fifth inning, in which the visitors obtained five hits. Johnny Bolster replaced him in the sixth and pitched effective ball for the last four innings.

The Corporation Drive

"Never in the memory of the oldest inhabitant" has there been known such a great quantity of lumber in the river at this time of the year. The corporation drive hung up a few weeks ago near Bristol on account of low water. The river raised about two feet last week but before a sufficient crew could be assembled it began to fall rapidly again. From a short distance above Florenceville to the booms the shores are lined and the bare covered with logs aggregating many millions feet. In former years all this lumber

would have been safely into the booms long before this, but the right recently given to the St. John Lumber Co. at Van Buren to put a boom across the river and hold all logs and sort them as they sawed their own, has thus seriously interfered with the driving corporation's operations.

It is common belief that postponed events never prove the success that they would have had they come off on the date originally planned for. If this is always true it would have been a regular hum-dinger of a time at the East Florenceville picnic last week. The day appointed dawned dark and frowning clouds hung about forbiddingly all day. There was heavy rain at times, so that there was nothing for it but to await "the next fine day," which chanced to be the very next day. A crowd large enough to assure success was early on the ground and every thing went off with a merry swing. The whole day's program was carried out in most pleasing style and wound up with the grand display of fireworks in the evening. The success of the affair was largely due to the energy and push of W. P. Stapleford who was engaged at the outset to have entire oversight and management of the picnic. The proceeds amounted to around \$1200, gross, and the net return will be used in fitting up a memorial hall in connection with the school—an honor to the soldier boys.

THE SCHOOL FAIR WAS A SUCCESS

Attendance was Large and Pupils Made Good Showing

The annual school fair of Hartland and vicinity was held on Tuesday and included besides the work of Hartland pupils that from Lower Brighton and Waterville scholars as well. The large attendance was particularly gratifying and encouraging not only to the teachers, but to the scholars as well. The exhibits were not so extensive as last year when the "greater production" idea was being pushed with more zest, but all the exhibits of school room work, and garden products and poultry, showed that the young exhibitors were deeply interested in their work. The principal promises to submit the large prize list for publication in the next issue, it not being possible to have it ready sooner.

A feature of the affair that delighted teachers and scholars and reflects credit on one public spirited parent was the gift of Savings Stamps Books, one for each grade, eleven in all, each with four stamps already in it. These were donated by A. R. Rigby and are to be awarded to the most generally efficient work done by one scholar in each grade. They are in themselves invaluable, and will teach thrift and saving to those who win them.

G. W. V. A.

Hartland branch G. W. V. A. have sent a strongly worded recommendation to Premier Borden in favor of a commission being appointed by the Dominion government to look into the matter of the returned soldiers. It would only be right that a soldier who gave his time and placed his body as a bulwark between our homes and the bitter, cruel German should have a common laborer's pay. While he was undergoing all kinds of danger and hardship at \$1.10 a day, and a small allowance for his family, the laborer at home was getting double—yes—three times as much pay while he was in peace and safety and had all of the home comforts. The Veterans are only asking for a commission to look into the matter in a fair and impartial way.

E. A. Britton, chairman of the executive, A. R. Rigby, chairman of the entertainment committee, and Dr. W. R. Currie, chairman of the sports committee, were appointed to see the Mayor and Aldermen of Hartland and enquire into the matter of a proper memorial for our fallen comrades. They are to report at our meeting on Oct. 2. All returned men are invited to attend our meeting. It is the duty of every returned soldier to join the G. W. V.
