QUEENS COUNTY CIRCUIT COURT

Gagetown, June 26.—The adjourned sittings of the Queen's County Circuit Court, King's bench division, commenced on Tuesday, June 22, in the court house, with His Honor Mr. Justice Chandler presiding.

At the opening of the adjourned sittings five actions were still awaiting trial. The case of Mortimer Thorne vs. Mrs. Etta May Peterson stands over until the October sittings. Messrs. Teed and Teed are appearing for the plaintiff and F. M. O'Neill, of Gagetown, for the defendant.

On Tuesday the case of Benjamin Appleby vs. Grant Gordon, both of Upper Gagetown, was taken up. It being an action for damages for assault. In this case R. B. Hanson, K. C., appeared for the plaintiff. The defendant was neither present nor represented by counsel. After hearing three witnesses for the plaintiff, His Honor Mr. Chandler directed that judgment be entered for plaintiff for \$100 and costs, to be charged on Supreme Court scale.

The case of Anna G. McIntosh vs. Jason Corey and Noah Corey was next taken up and occupied Wednesday and Thursday. This is an action for trespass to land, the defendants alleging that they received authority to cut timber off plaintiff's lands from her agent. The plaintiff denies that the alleged agent had authority from her. This case is of some length; but it is probable that it will go to the jury this evening. The evidence of the plaintiff and her grandfather was taken under a commission issued out of the Supreme Court in Vancouver, B. C. and was read in court. George H. V. Bolyea, K. C., and J. F. H. Teed are for the plaintiff and R. St. J. Preece for the defendants.

Two cases remain to be tried: James Boyd et al vs. the E. C. Atkinson Lumber Co. Ltd., an action for money claimed to be owing plaintiffs by defendant company on logging operations. The other case is Fraser vs. McEachern, an action regarding title to land.

SUGAR SMUGGLING ACROSS THE BORDER

Customs House Officer at Milltown Bridge Run Down and Injured by Truck

St. Stephen, N. B., June 27.—The traffic in sugar continues, but in diminishing volume due to increased vigilance on the part of government of Nova Scotia. Following instructions from Ottawa, orders have been issued that no sugar is to be transported in town between six p. m. and six a. m. under any pretext, and that all sugar in transit during these hours shall be concealed, together with the carrying vehicles, but there are still some venturesome operators willing to take a chance. There is still a large stock of sugar stored in barns about town which the profiteers are feverishly anxious to get transferred to the United States side of the river before the anticipated decline in the price of the stuff.

A high handed piece of work in the sugar traffic occurred at the Milltown bridge early Saturday morning of which more is quite likely to be heard. At two o'clock, and after the street lights were sent off, an auto truck was seen crossing the Calais side, and Patrick Coughlin, a crippled customs officer, and the only one then on duty, stepped into the street, and waved for the driver to stop. The order was disregarded and the truck of the car, discernible next morning, showed that the car had been so swerved as to catch the officer. Mr. Coughlin was dragged some distance before the car was stopped and, subsequently medical examination showed that the aged officer had sustained numerous cuts and bruises. The car might have kept right on and the old gentleman allowed to suffer any fate, had not his son, Harry Coughlin, who was a voluntary guardian of the safety of his father, mounted to the rear of the car and engaged the driver in a fight that terminated in the driver, a St. Stephen man, since being confined to his bed with a severe scalp wound, said to have been inflicted with a monkey wrench.

The Act is weak in that it allows too much latitude in the case of doctors, druggists and vendors who have practically the dispensing of liquors within their own hands.

Application has already been made by the Temperance people to have the Act amended in regard to recognised weaknesses and the Government is sympathetic—BUT NOTE THIS—the Government put off the granting of these improvements to make the Act more effective.
