A New Method of Keeping Potatoes.

A German publication, the Practical Statesman, has a new method for keeping potatoes and preventing sprouting consists in placing them in a layer of coke. Doctor Schiller, of Brunswick, who has published the method, is of the opinion that the improved ventilation by means of coke is not alone responsible for the result, but believes that it is due to the oxidation of the coke, which, however, is a very slow one. Coke always contains sulphur, and it is very possible that the minute quantities of oxides of carbon and sulphur, which result from the oxidation, mixing with the air and penetrating among the potatoes are sufficient to greatly retard sprouting. Potatoes so treated are said to keep in good condition until the following July. The music composer often finds

FESTIVAL OF ST. GEORGE.

Annual Sermon Preached by Ven. Archdeacon Forrester Before a Large Congregation in the Cathedral. Benevolent and Charitable Work of the Society.

The festival of St. George was fittingly honored last evening, when the members of St. George's and sister societies turned out in large numbers to hear the annual sermon, preached by the Venerable Archdeacon Forrester, M.A., before a very large congregation in Christ's Church Cathedral. The full evening service was given in all its impressiveness.

Before the service commenced, the members of the different societies gathered in the schoolhouse and from there they marched in a long procession into the church. Heading the procession his Worship Mayor McLaren and Mr. J. H. Collinson, President of St. George's Society. Following in order were Samuel Barker, M.P., and Adam Studholme, M.L.A., the committee in charge composed of Messrs. J. T. Gillard, S. F. Washington, K.C., W. A. Spratt, C. D. Blachford and James Gadsby; Thomas Parradine, P.D.D., Percy Glover and E. L. Rastrick, representing the Sons of England; T. J. Stewart, M.P., J. Orr Callaghan and Thomas Lester, representing the Irish Protestant Benevolent Society; Adam Brown and W. M. McClelland, representing St. Andrew's Society; Wm. Hunter and James Donaldson, representing the Sons of Scotland. These gentlemen were followed by the members of the various societies.

Taking as his text, James 1: 27, "Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this: to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction and to keep himself unpolluted from the world." Archdeacon Forrester, in a splendid sermon emphasized some significant truths in the work of mankind in the interests of charity.

The speaker counted it a privilege to speak before the members of the society, in the Cathedral. He rejoiced with the rector and the people of the church in their splendid resurrection from a bondage of debt.

Referring to the fact that Canon Abbott had spoken on the patriotic side of the work of St. George's Society, on Friday evening, Archdeacon Forrester said it was his intention to speak for a short time on the benevolent side of the work. He welcomed the visiting societies.

At the outset he said he recognized the fact that the national side of the work of the society was one of great importance. It was only natural and right that Englishmen should band themselves together, that they might take advantage of the opportunity to honor the country of their birth, and the country they love. He was glad that he had the privilege of occupying the position of one of the chaplains of a society that stands for so much good in the community.

Archdeacon Forrester pointed out that it was a Canadian's first duty to build up a national sentiment, and to always assist in the building of a nation that will take its place in the foremost ranks. Sturdy English character would be something to do with the spread of such a gospel. The blood of the Saxon, Roman, Dane and French have contributed their usefulness in the making of character, but the ennobling influence of the Bible has far much to do with the development of England's greatness.

"The people judge according to your character, therefore see to it that it will bring credit to the name of Canada and England," said the Archdeacon. "May we work to build up that empire, on whose shores the sun never sets," said the speaker.

In taking up the benevolent side of the work, Archdeacon Forrester said that it should be the desire of every man to pattern himself after Jesus Christ, and it would be found that beneficence permeated the whole life of the Master. It was not merely to follow Jesus, but to act the man as Jesus did. The whole of the New Testament was based on the principle of charity, and it was here that practical religion shows itself. One must be strong in spirit to believe in the Christian religion, which is based upon faith in a person—Jesus Christ—and it would be found that the faithfulness that the reward would be given. The great principle of loyalty to Jesus Christ was to keep oneself unpolluted from the world. A man might do many acts of kindness for which he would get credit, but to Jesus Christ there is to be something behind the motive of doing these acts other than selfishness, or personal popularity.

"I rejoice that St. George's Society does so much good in the community," said the Archdeacon. "In my parochial work I have witnessed many acts that are for themselves. It is very gratifying to see so many brave and professional men who give their time and money to carry good cheer and ready relief to a brother man. That, to my idea, is the true Christianity. It is carrying on the work of Jesus Christ to a finish."

Speaking of the brotherhood of man, Archdeacon Forrester said that the nearer one rises to the spirit of Jesus Christ the nearer one will reach the attainments of the idea of Jesus Christ—which is the brotherhood of man. This phrase contains the pith of the teachings of Jesus Christ.

It is in that spirit that we should go out and help all we come in contact with to attain the Fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man," said the Archdeacon. Coming to the close of his sermon, Archdeacon Forrester said that the society had a membership of 1,000, that 115 people were recipients of Christmas cheer last year, and that 1,000 relief orders were given. The total amount spent in such work was \$1,548. The mere figures on paper could not convey an adequate idea of the real work that was being accomplished. This society was doing that practical part of the religion of Jesus Christ.

WATCH YOUR REFRIGERATORS.

Are you aware, madam, that in your refrigerator exists a terrible menace to health—a prolific breeder of typhoid germs? You can't be too scrupulous in your care to keep it clean. First of all, don't let your well-intentioned husband connect its drain pipe directly with the drain, in spite of the great labor-saving it means to you. Rather empty the waste pan a dozen times a day than subject your food to the sewer gases that are bound to find their way from a drain into the ice box.

Clean the refrigerator at least twice a week. Remove everything in it that can be removed and then with strong warm ammonia water scour it carefully. Scour the shelves, too. The whole operation will take less than five minutes.

If you must keep milk and butter with other foods, put them in stoneware or china receptacles, which can be covered. Either will absorb the odors of other foods and are quick to catch disease germs. It's better to use stone or china for all foods, for tin or silver always more or less affects foods when they are kept in it for any length of time.

Examine every morning each article of food. Throw it away instantly if it bears the slightest taint, or else scald or cook it again. Owing to the article of food will quickly contaminate the rest.

Always keep some charcoal or a lump of dry lime in the food box, as an absorbent of impurities. Never put warm food in your refrigerator. Warmth generates moisture and hastens decay.

CLOCK WITH 20 DIALS.

Tells Time All Over the World and Gives Day and Date. San Diego, Cal., has a wonderful clock with twenty dials which tell simultaneously the time in all parts of the world, also the days of the week and the date and month. It stands twenty-one feet high and four of its dials are each four feet in diameter. The master clock is enclosed in plate glass, says Popular Mechanics, so that every action can be seen, and the whole illuminated every night. It is jewelled with tourmaline, topaz, agate and jade and took fifteen months to build. The motive power is a 200 pound weight, which winds itself automatically. The cost of the clock was \$3,000.

Friends can't be so very thick when they can see through each other. Those who marry to haste frequently find that they have no leisure for repentance. Birmingham, Ala., April 26.—A small crowd of men seized a negro who was being taken to jail in Bessemer late last night, and hanged him to a tree in the woods. After the lynching the crowd quietly dispersed, leaving the body to sway in the wind all night. The negro, John Thomas, had been arrested on a charge of criminally assaulting Mrs. Peterson, near Harkwood, yesterday. He was found near the scene of the crime, and his captors, numbering a dozen, took the negro before Mrs. Peterson, who identified him. Thomas finally confessed to the crime, but asked the men to spare his life. The response was a rope and he was soon swinging to a tree.

Crows and Winkles. Large flocks of crows are in the fields and on the shores. Clams and mussels are about all the food they can get, except perhaps a few winkles now and then. As these winkles have a tough shell the crows, when he finds one, will fly for the shore and over a flat ledge when at a height of thirty or forty feet the crow will stop his flight and drop the winkle on the rocks, thus breaking the shell. Then perhaps a dozen will gather around and ravenously eat the sweet morsel. It is doubtful if the crow destroys as much as he is accused of doing.—From the Lewiston Journal.
