**EXHIBITION OF NERVE**

Barnard Koehler and F. Hisgen, two house painters began painting a large house at Betts street and Centre avenue N. Y. Three o'clock the afternoon found them crouching under the eaves of the house and sixty-five feet from ground. They had just finished the surface within reach, and started to lower the scaffold a few feet. When the required distance had been reached, Hisgen called to his partner to hold on to the rope until he (Hisgen) tied his own, when he would come over and perform a service for him. Hisgen had completed his own knot when Koehler cried out: "Come quick, I can't hold it." Hisgen, as quickly as possible, started across the aerial bridge, but not gone two steps when he felt the ladder give way beneath him. As he began the fall, the energy of desperation with both hands, grasped almost smooth top of the four story window cornice and then hung in the air, a distance sixty feet from the pavement. He then gave an exhibition nerve that terrified every one who saw it. Placing the toe of one foot against the window frame he gave his body a slight pendulum motion away from the house. A second push gave him a better impetus, and as swung on the return toward the window he released his hold, went crashing through the glass safely to the floor of the four story room, from whence he immediately looked out through the aperture he had made to what had become of his companion Koehler had not quite so fortunate. As he was shooting through the air, he caught the hanging rope with both hands and lessened speed all the way down at expense of all the cuticle of palms, which was burnt off by the friction. He landed in sitting position on the sidewalk and was taken to the hospital with a pair of very sore hips.
