The experience of the doctors and nurses at the Tottenham (London) Deaconesses' Institution and Training Hospital, is evidently in favour of temperance principles. It was said that the work went on best when the consumption of alcohol was reduced to a minimum. During the last year only £5 had been expended for spirits to be used as medicine.

During the English Parliament, now in session, no less than fourteen bills affecting the liquor trade were introduced, six of which were for the closing of the public-houses on Sundays; one prohibiting the payment of wages in public houses; one respecting beer adulteration; another, to give power in Scotland to veto the liquor traffic, and the others related to closing the public-houses and corrupt practices in time of elections.

From the tenth annual report of the London Temperance Hospital, it appears that the in-patients admitted and treated during the year were 411, and from the opening of the hospital, 1,765. There is also a large and increasing number of out-patients four times a week. The doctors have power to prescribe alcohol as a drug, but have seen no reason to do so, and they regard its absence as tending rather to rapidity of recovery and successful treatment of the most serious diseases. The mortality of the hospital has been from the first extremely low. The accumulated facts and extending experience of the Temperance Hospital cannot fail to produce a powerful effect on the public and private practice of medical men in regard to the use of alcohol even in cases where it has been generally considered essential.

VERA SASSULITCH.

Remarkable Career of a Russian Charlotte Vera Sassulitch was born in 1850, according to the (apparent) most trustworthy authorities, and in 1867 was shut up in a Lithuanian prison for the offence of being a schoolmate of the sister of Netchieff, the the compassion of a gendarme, who covered her with his cloak. For some years she was

passed on from town to town as a "suspuntil, having spent the best years of he in prison, a victim to the INSOLENCE AND BRUTALITY OF THE POLICE. she had learned to pity those who were similarly afflicted, and to desire to avenge them. In 1878 she learned of the brutai ill-treat-

A romantic version made it seem that Vera Sassultch had been acquainted with Bogolu-boff—had even been his mistress—but there was no truth in the story. She read with indignation of the outrage, and waited some time to see if the Government would pay any attention to it. When no action was taken she resolved to do vengeance herself, and on the 5th of February, 1878, went to the gene-ral's reception-room with a petition, and when he stretched out his hand to receive it, shot him through the body. She made no effort to escape, and said that she had fired upon the general premeditatedly, without caring whether she killed him or merely wounded whether she killed him or merely wounded him, since in the latter case her end would be attained of calling attention to his brutality. She was brought to trial in April, 1878, and defended by M. Alexandroff. The jury selected was composed of six members of the Civil Service, two merchants and a notleman, a school inspector, a student and an artist, and it acquitted her promptly, amid the applause of the audience, despite the evidence, her avowal, and the speeches of the judge and the prosecutor.
