**BIG OR INGE CELE-BRATION IN ST JOHN SATURDAY** 

A celebration of the 100th anni versary of the foundation of their order in New Brunswick was held by the Orangemen of the province in St. John on Saturday and was one of the most successful ever staged there, It was the biggest Orange parade since 1909 when there were 4.000 Orangemen in the parade. Saturday's parade numbered in all about 2,000. The morning broke clear and as the day advanced the mercury rose until during the parade it hovered around the 86 mark. Although the route of procession extended over a distance of four miles no one faltered and the ranks at the conclusion of the bong walk were just as complete as

when they started. Grand Master H.T. Brewer of Fredericton rode the white borse symbolizing King William of Orange After the parade returned to Barrack Green the Grand Master and County Master R.G. Magee addressed the assembled Orangemen and His Wor ship Mayor Potts bade them welcome to the city. The speeches of the day were delivered by Grand Master H.T. Brewer, Rev. A.L. Tedford and Kev. A.D. McLeod In the evening supper was served on the grounds and band concerts and numerous games constituted the amusements. Thousands o people were on the ground during the afternoon and evening. 
