**The Government Should Help.**

Owing to the failure of the fishery there last year, the fishermen living at Bolster's Rock, Labrador, found themselves in pretty bad straits and the Government were obliged to send supplies to them to bring them over the winter. These supplies are, of course, used up now and the men find themselves still in an unfortunate situation. The southern people going down there will not give them supplies for the coming fishery fearing a repetition of the failure of last year. If they do not get supplies now they cannot fish and will be a tax upon the revenue again the coming winter. The Government should guarantee supplies for these unfortunate people the coming summer and get proper security to cover such advances if the fishery proves to be profitable.

**Trouble Over Chinaman**

Yesterday a celestial who came by the Mongolian was stopped from landing here by the Customs authorities until he could deposit the head tax of \$300. The man said his name was Kam Lung and that he resided here before and only now came from a trip to China. Some of the Chinese brought down from the city did not know him and the man has been detained pending further enquiry.

She brought a large general cargo but no passengers.

**Justice and Peace.**

**EULOGY BY PRESIDENT OF ARBITRATION TRIBUNAL.**

**THE HAGUE, June 3.**

The Arbitration Tribunal, which has been assigned the task of settling the Newfoundland fisheries dispute, held its first session yesterday. Its first business session will be held on Monday. The sittings are to be public. The Court consists of the following: Dr. Lammach, Professor of International Law at the University of Vienna, President; Dr. Drago, Argentine; Dr. Saverin Lohman, the Netherlands; Judge Geo. Gray, United States; Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada. The British Agent is Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, and the U. S. Agent is Chandler P. Anderson. Dr. Lammach in his inaugural speech said that by submitting a century old dispute to the Court, the U. S. and England have expressed their complete confidence in the pacific method of settling international conflicts, and have given example to the whole community of nations and have won for themselves fresh credit in the cause of international justice and peace, and for which those Powers have done more than any other nation, especially during the reign of the great monarch whose sudden death has so recently been lamented by the whole world.

**America's Biggest Customers.**

**WASHINGTON, D.C., June 3.**

British territory is the world's greatest market for American manufactures, in the face of the fact that Great Britain is Europe's greatest manufacturer and the world's greatest exporter of manufactures. Nearly one-half of all the exported manufactured products of the U. S. goes to British territory and forms more than a third of all the exports to those lands. These facts are disclosed in a summary compiled by the Bureau of Statistics of the Department of Commerce and Labor. By the term British territory is meant the United Kingdom, Canada and all other lands over which floats the Union Jack. Even to the district at Hong Kong and the British Islands in Oceania, British territory in Europe in 1909 took one hundred and thirty-two million dollars of American manufactures; British North America, ninety-seven million dollars; Asia, thirteen million dollars, and even British Africa took seven millions. Thus Great Britain buys 40 per cent. of all American manufactures sent to Europe; 46 per cent. of all those exported on the North American Continent; one per cent. of those to South America; 74 per cent. of those to Oceania, and 69 per cent. of all sent to Asia. British territory then is a pretty good customer. In all it bought two hundred and seventy-five hundred million dollars of Yankee goods in 1909. Of the unmanufactured products of the United States, British territory takes 48 per cent.

**ST. PETERSBURG, June 3.**

In response to representations made by him, the Jewish members of the Duma were informed to-day that Emperor Nicholas has authorized the Caucasian authorities to make certain concessions to Jews residing in the Caucasus. The health resorts of the Caucasus are frequented much by persons desiring the benefit of baths to be had there. The law, however, forbids the residence of Jews in this district.

**Revolution Threatened in Peking.**

**PEKIN, June 3.**

The foreign consuls here have received a warning from the revolutionists which is similar to that sent to the Legations before. "It purports to come from the 'Revolutionary Board of War,' and announces that a day has been appointed for the opening of hostilities. Neutrals are warned not to interfere with the military preparations, and protection is offered for foreigners. Pending this notice the Consuls, however, are urging their fellow citizens to leave the city."
