## Letter From Oporto.

The Board of Trade have received the following message from Lind and Conto, of Oporto: "The demand, although not very active, must be considered fairly good for the present condition of this country, as the continued emigration has considerably reduced the consumption in the agricultural districts where labor is now very scarce. Owing to the lower tariff enjoyed by Norway, Germany and other countries having commercial treaties with Portugal, fish of British origin continues to lose ground in this market. The British fish pays 39 reis per kilo, whereas the Norwegian and German pay only 34 reis. The British Chamber of Commerce in Portugal is now working hard to get a Treaty of Commerce established between England and Portugal, and those who can bring their influence to bear in the matter, should now do all possible to bring arrangements to a successful issue."

He has been about 1 1/2 years in the service, and there was missing lately \$200 sent by the Savings Bank here to a man residing at Cape Ray, \$300 sent from Bonne Bay to the branch Bank of Montreal at Bay of Islands, and \$11 sent unregistered from Curling to Magistrate O'Donnell at St. George's. The prisoner confessed stealing the letters and taking the money, and the police have a theory as to the mail car affair, on which they are working assiduously.
