This man, he writes, "deserves the greatest honor for his unflinching and conspicuous gallantry during the whole of those terrible days, as it was indeed chiefly owing to his coolness and indomitableness that Lieut. Niven, after Major Gault, D. S. O., had been knocked out, was able to save the entire position; it was Sergt. Cookson who got the vital despatch through for reinforcements and brought them up when volunteers were called for this perilous task, and I guess no one living to tell the tale of those days of real hell will ever deny the justice of honoring this brave man who fought as a Gordon Highlander in South Africa with those who have given prominence to."

Porthole Flash.

Excuses of Sentenced White Star Steward.

Charged with conduct likely to cause the destruction of or damage to the White Star liner Megantic and with being in possession of military clothing, Leslie Joseph Minter, an eighteen-year-old ship's steward, was at Liverpool yesterday sentenced to two months' imprisonment.

It was stated that while the Megantic was on the way from Plymouth to Liverpool Minter was seen at midnight on May 25 to open a porthole and use a flashlight. Some time before two German submarines had been observed. When brought before the captain Minter said he was trying to see Holyhead with a torchlight, but it was pointed out that he was on the wrong side of the ship to see Holyhead.

Minter admitted that he opened the porthole but denied using a flashlight, though he admitted that he had one in his baggage. The military clothing was left in the steamer by soldiers. He was stated to be the son of a London Post Office official and to have had an adventurous career. — Daily Mail, July 22.
