French and British soldiers are displaying an alarming fastidiousness as to when and where and whom they will fight. ARMED ACTIVITY.

There are at present four major entres of armed activity in the Near East, with half a dozen other scenes of recurring outbreaks. Each of the later would have been deemed serious in pre-war times and fully written up in the press. Now a busy censorship does its best to keep the disturbing tidings from the people back home. These four fighting areas do not in-

clude revoluntionized Russia, nor yet the bellicose Balkans or the cantankerous Caucasus.
