Any person taking or receiving for his private use any share of the proceeds or benefit of such lottery or scheme, and any person knowingly alding another in procuring such shares for his own use, shall be guilty of an offence under this chapter. The term expenses above mentioned shall not include the payment of any sum by way of commission to any person concerned in the promotion or conduct of such lottery or scheme."
