## Rum Ships Interfere

Rum ships, dragging their anchors ashore where capture awaits, have done so much damage to the trans-Atlantic cables that protests have Chafe many years of happiness. been sent to Washington, which, in turn, has suggested that the companies take the matter up with the Coast Guard Service. It was her second trip within the year to repair

cables on rum row. Inquiry at the offices of the other cable companies brought out the fact both the Commercial Cable Company and the French Cable Company have suffered, and it developed that the danger of interruption of communication is so serious that the matter was reported to the Treasury Department. That department replied that complaint should be lodged with the coast guards and the French Cable Company did so in a letter of protest.

At the offices of the Commercial Company it was said that they had experienced breaks both in their Atantic and Pacific cables. The last Atlantic break was on March 2. The repair ship Marie Louise Mackay was sent out to repair it, and, pulling up the cable, found that it had been severed in two. Ordinarily when a vessel's anchor runs foul of a cable she slips her anchor and makes application to the cable company for reimbursement. When the claim is dennine there is little difficulty shout adjusting the matter as it is cheaper to pay for an anchor than to repair cable, officials said. In the case of ruin runners it is difficult, however, they point out. Rum ships have no legal standing and could not press or even present a claim. Caring more for their anchors than for the cables, it was stated that when they run afoul of the submarine cables they pull

them up and chop them in two to get The French Cable Company reports that the last occasion of cable cutting was on April 1 and 2. There was a storm blowing on those days, and two of the company's three cables became completely severed. The company had to charter a repair ship at a cost of \$2,500 a day, for a minimum of ten days, and it estimates that its losses from damage done by rum ships this year has amounted to \$50,-

Officials of the Coast Guard Service could not be reached, but it is understood that the coast guards are without authority in the matter.

Probably no word has been the object of as much learned and heated argument as "necessaries"-such as parents and guardians are legally bound to provide for a person under age. What may be "necessary" for a person of one class may be a luxury for another of lower degree, and the problem is to determine what are "necessaries" in scores of different


