Flowers, although outweighted by 15 pounds, carried the fight to Townsend, finally sending him to his knees. The Buffalo man quickly recovered but a towel was thrown into the ring. Townsend weighed 185, Flowers 170. Boch Rodgers, of this city, knocked out Jack Lester in the second round. Lester substituted for Babe Ruth, another local fighter, who was unable to appear on account of illness.
