Proceedings at the Legislative Council

(Continued from page 9.)

The House was unanimous in the request that the Hon. Mr. Morine should express their opinion.

The Committee rose and reported having passed the Bill without amendment. The report was received on motion of Hon. Mr. Morine and by unanimous consent of the House the Bill was read a third time, and passed, and a message sent to the Assembly to that effect.

HON. PRESIDENT read a message from the House of Assembly that they had passed the Council's amendments to Bills re "Firearms" and "Lobster Fishery" without amendment.

The House then adjourned until 2.30 p.m. Friday.

FRIDAY, April 3.

The Council met pursuant to adjournment.

At 4 o'clock p.m. His Excellency the Governor Sir William Lamont Allardice, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, arrived at the Chamber and being seated on the Throne, commanded the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, through the Hon. President, to summon the members of the House of Assembly to the Bar of the House, who, being come thereto, His Excellency was pleased to give his assent to the following Bills:

"An Act Relating to the Constitution of the Supreme Court."

"An Act to amend the Chapter 'Of Banks and Banking.'"

"An Act to amend 'An Act to Incorporate the Women's Patriotic Trust Fund and for Other Purposes.'"

"An Act to amend the Chapter 'Of the Election of Members to the House of Assembly.'"

"An Act to amend the Chapter 'Of Light Dues.'"

"An Act to provide for the Con-

struction, Reconstruction and Maintenance of Highways."

"An Act to Regulate Travel on Highways and the Speed, Operation and Load of Vehicles Thereon."

"An Act to Amend the War Pensions Act, 1922."

"An Act Respecting the Lobster Fishery."

"An Act Relating to Firearms and Other Weapons."

"An Act to Amend the Act 'Of the House of Assembly.'"

"An Act Relating to the St. John's Dry Dock."

The members of the House of Assembly then withdrew and His Excellency was pleased to retire.

HON. ROBINSON stated that during yesterday's session he had received the following letter from the Honorary Secretary of the Women's Franchise League, namely:

"The Women's Franchise League wishes to express its great appreciation to you for having presented and for having so ably supported the 'Bill for Woman Suffrage.'"

"Now that the struggle is over, and our objective attained, we extend our sincere gratitude to you and all the members of the Legislative Council, through whose efforts the Women of Newfoundland have at last been enfranchised."

"Hoping to justify the responsibilities we have assumed, and on behalf of the Women's Franchise League,

The honourable gentleman tabled the letter.

HON. MR. MORINE suggested that with the unanimous consent of the House the letter be inserted in the Minutes, and it was ordered accordingly.

The House resolved into Committee on the Bill entitled "An Act Respecting the Encouragement of Shipbuilding." Hon. Mr. Milley in the Chair.

HON. MR. BISHOP said it appeared to him that paragraph number one applied only to vessels built in Newfoundland. If any vessel purchased in Nova Scotia was now under repair, she was in his opinion not entitled to the bounty. He would like to get some information on the matter.

HON. MR. MORINE said the point was well taken, and he would enquire as to what the intention of the Government was.

HON. THE PRESIDENT asked the Hon. Leader of the Government as to the reasons for the Bill being brought in.

HON. MR. MORINE replied the position was taken by the Government that the cost of building and repairing was so great there was need for some encouragement. This was done in order to stimulate the fishery, and particularly the Labrador, and with the proposed bounty repairing of vessels, many of which are now idle because of needed repairs or reconstruction would be undertaken, which otherwise would not take place.

HON. DR. MOSDELL enquired whether the vessels such as those used in the South West Coast fishery come under this Bill.

HON. MR. MORINE replied that there was a limit of 15 tons, and under this they were considered boats not vessels.

HON. MR. TEMPLEMAN considered it rather late in the year to bring a Bill of this kind before the House, as the vessels would soon be fitting out for the fishery. It had not always been possible to get vessels built here, and he did not see why the owners of those which had been built in Nova Scotia should not be able to have their repairs attended to as well as the men who had their built here.

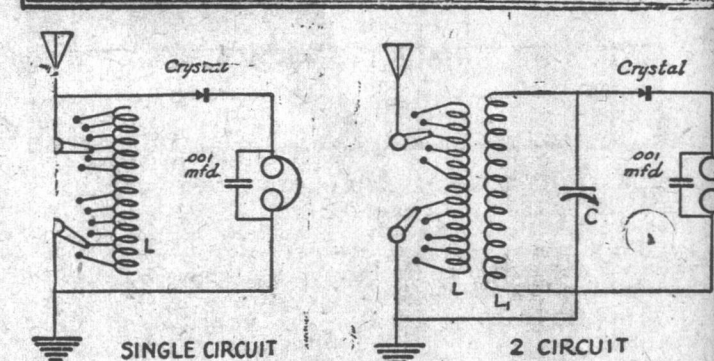
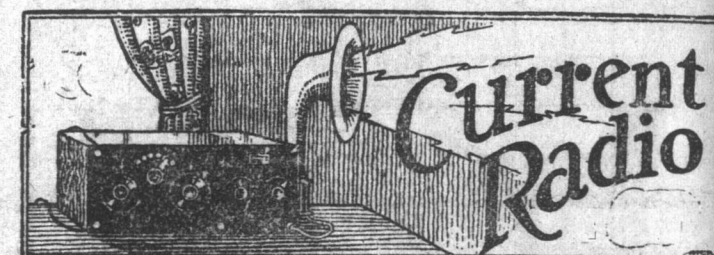

Improving the Selectivity of a Crystal Set

Above we show to the left the standard "single circuit" crystal receiver. This receiver is not selective in congested broadcasting districts. It may be impossible to tune out powerful local stations. With little trouble, however, this set can be converted into a "two circuit" receiver by the addition of one more coil and a variable condenser. If modified as shown to the right in our figure, this set will be quite selective—its selectivity being about on a par with any standard regenerative set.

The original coil will have a diameter of 3 or 4 inches and from 40 to 60 turns of wire on it. Get another form (cardboard or hard rubber or bakelite) whose diameter is such that it will fit easily in the original coil. If this diameter is 3 inches, wind on 75 turns of No. 22 or No. 24 double cotton covered wire. If 4 inches in diameter wind on 60 turns of the same size wire. This is the coil L₁ in the figure. It should not be tapped, but the full winding should be used all the time. When shunted by a .00025 Mfd. (17 plate) variable condenser the secondary circuit will have a wavelength range from about 200 to 530 meters when either diameter coil is used. If you have a .0005 Mfd. (25 plate) variable condenser the number of turns in the 3-inch coil can be reduced to 55 and only 40 turns will be required for the 4-inch coil to cover the same wavelength range.

Please note that the rotating plates of the condenser C should be connected to the ground, and not the stationary plates. Connecting the rotary plates to ground greatly cuts down the amount of body capacity effect which is directly responsible for stations fading out when the hand is removed from the tuning condenser.

Some means should be provided whereby the coil L₁ can be slid in and out of coil L. In fact some reception will be best when L₂ is all the way out of L₁, and at other times (when there is little interference) reception may be best when L₂ is inside of L₁.

Converting the crystal receiver as outlined above is well worth while as it greatly increases the selectivity and gives better signal strength.
