The Railway Board ordered that some means be first taken to stop the constant erosion of the treacherous banks at this point, and it was hoped that the construction of a dam would do the trick. The dam, however, does not seem to hold, and has washed out now for the third time. Evidently some other method will have to be employed in construction.

We quote the following from the Vernon, B.C. News, concerning Mr. G. E. Whiten, father of Mrs. H. E. Armstrong, of this place, who is a veteran curler: "One of the most interesting side games played during the season at the curling rink was pulled off on Monday night when two rinks, skipped respectively by G. E. Whiten and W. Forester upheld the prowess of the local Methodist and Presbyterian "Knights of Besom." Victory on this occasion fell to the Methodist rink by a score of 13 to 8. 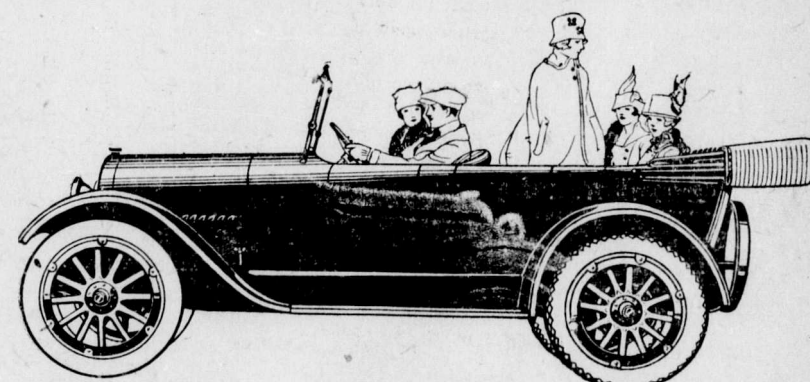
