The Canadian farmer, taking all his circumstances into consideration, may hold his head as high as those of the same occupation in the British Isles. Yet he is continually reminded of the difference there is between the product per acre there and here. When the timber is cleared from the land, the new soil yields abundantly, but in the older-settled parts of Canada, it is vain to look for the large yield that might be had under a better system of hus bandry with the lack of capital that exists. In the British Islands money can be had for the purpose of making permanent improvements at from 3 to 4 per cent. Here money is worth from 8 to 9 per cent. The owner of the land there is generally independent, and the working farmer a tenant, whose capital is not invested in the land itself, but in the stock which is necessary to carry on the farm. Too much land and too small a capital would seem to be the cause of the difference in the yield per acre. The profits that are made in leaning money go a long way ahead of matches at 25c. a box and baking soda at 10c. a pound. In our Cities Loan and Building Societies are multiplying fast; these sell their Debedtures in England at 3, 4, and 5 per cent. They prefer farm security to any other. Our farmers consequently furnish the security, and these Companies charge 4 or 5 per cent. for handling the money.

The loaning of money by the Government in Britain for farm improvement has worked exceedingly well, and no solid reason can be given why it should not work exceedingly well here. If there is any other project that will do more for the material prosperity of the country we fail to see it.
