Result of Collision on the Grand Trunk Sarnia Branch.

CAUSE OF ACCIDENT.

The accident, according to Mr. Price, master of transportation, of London, was caused by the failure of the station agent and operator at Watford, to deliver to the train crew of the express their orders to pass the freight train at Wanstead. Mr. Price says that, in explanation of the terrible results, the operator says that he understood the dispatch was to kill the orders for the express to pass the freight at Wanstead. It is denied in the despatcher's office that the order was killed.
 The Pacific express, which was late, and endeavoring to make up time, was made up of two Pullman cars, two first-class day coaches and two baggage cars. The engineer opened wide his throttle as he pulled out of Watford at 9.58 o'clock. A blizzard was raging. The train was crowded with people returning from holiday trips. The express was running fully fifty miles an hour through the storm, when, at the Wanstead siding, the headlight of the freight engine loomed up through the snow. It was impossible to see a hundred feet ahead because of the snow, and the trains crashed together almost before the engine crews realized that a collision was imminent. The impact threw the two engines clear of the track on the right hand side. The two day coaches were between the heavily-loaded baggage cars and the heavy Pullmans.
 With a terrific grinding crash the rear baggage car telescoped the forward day coach. The baggage car was driven into the coach for three-fourths of its length, and in a twinkling a score of occupants were dead, and two more score pinned down under the wreckage, crushed and mangled.

THE INVESTIGATION.

Wyoming, Ont., Dec. 30.—The coroner's jury which for two days past has been investigating the Wanstead disaster returned a verdict at 11.40 tonight, after being cooped up for nearly four hours. The jury found that the collision was due to wrong orders being given to the express at Watford, but as between Despatcher Kerr and Operator Carson, it could not agree upon whom rested the responsibility for the issue of the wrong orders. The jury considered that the accident could have been averted after the train left Watford, had the railway more experienced operators at Wyoming and Kingscourt Junction, at each of which places the despatcher had ample time to get the trains stopped, but was unsuccessful in his endeavors.
