A sermon or lecture can never be read from the lips, but only a few home words. The deaf mutes themselves find their voices are unpleasant, and that strangers can hardly understand them. If any deaf mute can hear a little by use of a instruments, he may learn to speak better than a totally deaf one. I find signs are so useful. They are the deaf mutes natural speech and they can tell a long story in a short time with lightning speed, even faster than shorthand or speech. I myself have talked to the Northwest Indians by signs and they could also tell me stories of hunting for game, etc., by signs also, when not one could understand a few words I uttered which I learnt at school.

I hope the Government will do something for those deaf mutes of weak intellect. Several have been sent home from the schools and their parents could do nothing and only allow them to ream about the streets and grow up in ignorance which put bad impressions in the public's heads to think all other deaf mutes are like them. I have seen hundreds of dea mutes from Quebec to Toronte, and I finather eduction is not good and they also have have struggle to get on in the world.
