LET SCIENCE AND PRAYER WORK TOGETHER IN HEALING

Medical Men Carry the Means God Has Provided.

Rev. Dr. Johnston Speaks on an Interesting Subject.

In a most impressive sermon delivered last evening in his pulpit at St. Andrew's Church, Rev. Dr. Johnston spoke of divine healing. The attendance was large, there scarcely being sufficient seating capacity in the church for all who attended the service. He prefaced his dealing with the subject by historical references to the great plagues which have visited the world. He then admitted the curing by faith, but explained that it was not the ordinary means of healing appointed by God. The ordinary means, he said, should be used in co-operation with divine assistance, and he hoped that the time when sickness would no longer be known on earth. From the 103rd Psalm he quoted: "Bless the Lord, O my soul, who forgiveth all thine iniquities; With this as his text, he proceeded to tell something of the story of the suffering that had been endured throughout the ages. With Christ there had been the 37 plagues, which contained a record that had been appalling. Some of these he mentioned particularly, for instance, the great plague of the second century, the black plague, and the great plague of London. These were but glimpses into the sufferings, and one of the saddest features of it was that they were interpreted as being visitations from God, and there had been a terrible misjudging of the Almighty. They were, too, but glimpses into the storm clouds of sickness that swept the earth. He pictured all the sickness there was at the present day, and said: "Tell me, is it a reality or a delusion? Is it the Word of God, or is it the Word of man, and to be thought of as imaginary?" The Lord said: "I am the Lord who healeth, and if that sickness were not real, then the Lord was engaged in fighting something that was imaginary."

CURING BY FAITH.

Scripture and science alike recognize that God was the source of life and health. Scripture was clear, full and pronounced on this matter, and Dr. Johnston gave a number of passages from the Bible to prove his assertion. Science acknowledged this also. It was discovering more and more that nature was healed, and what was nature but God? He gave examples to show that science had paid tribute to the power of God, and if that were true, at not right that he should have the honor and the tribute of the world? He called upon the medical men of the present time to praise him who had made them instruments in his hands. Continuing, Dr. Johnston said in part: "In the bestowment of health God ordinarily makes use of suitable means provided by the economy of nature. No one will deny that there are these means. It is impossible to deny that there are certain states of feeling which act as remedial agencies. Whether these are produced through imagination, faith or suggestion or in any way, those who do produce them are of use. The tales of the cures by faith, such as at St. Anne de Beaupre and other shrines, are simple history. Why deny the cures by faith? Whether these cures have been produced by faith or through any other remedial agency, they are not to be taken as the normal or ordinary means. They do not prove the non-necessity of other means. Faith does not mean the neglect of these means, but the wise use of them. You will find repeated references which recognize these means and the medical calling and the means that he intends to use in the restoration of health. "We recognize the necessity of proper sanitation of our houses, then why should we not recognize proper sanitation of our bodies? If those who advocate the cure by faith alone are believed, then there is a better remedy than the cure by faith, and I fear there is a great danger, one that will menace the community, and the state itself will find it necessary to deal with this heresy. God having provided the means, faith means obedience to and the proper acceptance of these means. To say this is unnecessary, we might think of the Bible, listening to the places of worship and say that he has provided for our salvation, without us doing anything. "All means possible should be used to ameliorate suffering, and we endeavor to provide places for the sick; let the nurses recognize that they are coworkers with God. We are the feet and hands of God. I appeal to you, medical men, having received your profession; do not separate it from the spiritual, but do recognize that God is behind it all. Some physicians, and I say it in sorrow, seem to resent the man who carries spiritual help to those who are ill, but there are men who are fools in every profession. It seems to me that the man who is actually and to be sick is doing his share in relieving the sufferer. I have seen a man, sick in bed, who has sunk into a slumber as peaceful as that of a child, listening to the words: 'The Lord is my shepherd.' I am not complaining myself. As far as the London physicians are concerned I have found nothing but co-operation. God is the true helper and, medical men, you need to be good men to carry the means that God has provided for the cure of the sick. You are God's messengers, do not be unworthy of your work. "There should be more praying for the sick. Send for the good men. Let all that science has discovered be used and let there be added thereto the prayers of Godly men. Let us pray God will go with every medical man, and everyone who is called to heal the sick. As you recommend the surgeon who has been skillful, so sound the praises of him who has given you back your life. May the day come, and coming it is, when universal health shall remain and sickness shall hide, and when sickness and sighing shall be no more."

PUPILS ATTENDING SEPARATE SCHOOLS NOW NUMBER 783

Receipts During Past Year Were Over \$8,000, Permitting Reduction of Debt.

The 45th annual report of the Catholic School Board of this city, which has just been printed, was distributed among the supporters of the separate schools yesterday. Aid. John Forristal, who was chosen chairman of the board during the past year, speaks with much satisfaction in his annual address of the progress made during the year, both from an educational and financial point of view. He mentioned the success of the separate school pupils in their examinations, and added: "I wish also to testify to the great interest taken, and the valued services rendered, by the Rev. Father McKean, during his term as local superintendent, and to express the deep regret of every member of the board in receiving his resignation. This was due to his appointment as parish priest of St. Mary's Church. I am pleased to state that Rev. Father Egan has already proven himself a worthy successor. The board is also grateful to His Lordship the Bishop for his frequent visits during the year, and for his generosity in awarding and distributing at the various schools so many valuable prizes, thus giving an encouragement to the pupils and calling forth their best efforts. "The chairman added that after furnishing all supplies necessary for thorough efficiency in the conducting of the schools, the board reduced the debt last year by over \$1,600. "There are now seven separate schools in this city, with a total number on the roll of 783 pupils, and an average attendance of above 627. The total receipts of the board during the year were \$8,177 16, of which \$7,388 27 is raised by tax rate in the city of London. The assessments for separate school purposes were:
