Chicago, July 24.—There were fancy prices again in July oats and July corn to relieve the monotony of a grain session otherwise dull. The former jumped 3c to a new record price. 70c. The latter sold at 70c, but did not hold its strength. The general situation in grains was very unsatisfactory to the trade at large, owing to the congestion in July options. Fuctuations were narrow in deferred futures, and aside from the fair weather, the bearish influence that predominated was that of unstraddling September. December wheat spread, September wheat closed ½c to ½c down. September corn ½c to ¼c lower, and September oats ½c lower; July oats gained 3c. Provisions closed 20c to 22½c higher. Local receipts of wheat were 125 cars, only one of contract grade; Minneapolis and Duluth reported 191 cars, making a total for the three points of 316 cars, against 377 last week and 548 a year ago. Primary receipts were 1.037,000 bu, against 999,000 bu last year. Seaboard clearances in wheat and flour equaled 307,000 bu. The seaboard reported 10 loads taken for export. Corn was dull and inanimate most of the day. Cables were higher, receipts small, but closing prices showed a slight decline in most options. July was unchanged, at 67c, and at the close September sold between 60%c to 61½c, and closed easy. ½c to ¼c down, at 61½. STILL A MYSTERY

Death of George Whalley Unexplained-No Reason for Suicide.

Toronto, July 25.-The police have thoroughly investigated the manner of life of Geo. Whalley, the shipper, found dead in Evans & Sons' wholesale drug warehouse last Sunday, under circumstances that pointed either to sulcide by poison or to murder. The result is to prove that Whalley had no possible motive in taking his own life. The man's stomach is now being analyzed by Prof. Ellis, and if poison is found in it the case will assume the importance of the celebrated Sternaman case, and the body of Geen, the young shipper, who was found dying in the warehouse a month ago, will be exhumed to

see if he, too, was poisoned. It is said that Whalley and Geen knew the identity of some persons intimately acquainted with the warehouse who tried to set it on fire in May last, after a clumsy attempt at burglary, and that this person got rid of the danger of detection by putting poison in liquor which both men may have drunk.

In Geen's case he had drunk some sherry just before death, and in Whalley's it is believed that he may have had some liquor shortly before death. The pay of both men was missing when they were found, although neither had had opportunity to dispose

Whalley's wife says that this is the strongest reason for her belief that her husband was murdered, because in the thirty years of her married life her husband had always brought home his pay envelope to her.

ST. SWITHIN'S DAY

How Many Know the Story on Which the Old Tradition Rests?

An old tradition says that if it rains on St. Swithin's Day, July 15, it will on Tuesday, July 15, and it has rained pretty much ever since. St. Swithin was an old-time Bishop of Winchester. How his name came to be connected with continuous rains is told in the following story: When he died he left instructions that his burial should be n the churchyard, instead of in the chancel along with the other bishops. His wishes were carried out, but later some monks, thinking it beneath his dignity to remain out in the churchyard among the common people, began to dig up the ground about the grave preparatory to removing his body to the chancel. However, no sconer had they set spade to earth than it began to rain, and poured in torrents for 40 days thereafter. The monks took it that they had received a gentle hint from heaven that their labors were unappreciated and thenceforth St. Swithin was allowed to have his own way as to the place of his sepulchre. 
