POLITICAL POINTS

There are now four vacancies in the senate, and when they are filled the house will consist of 43 Conservatives and 38 Liberals—a Conservative majority of 5.

Parliamentary bye-elections take place today (Wednesday) in nine constituencies—Addington, West Durham, West Hastings, Kingston, West York, Ontario, Laval, L'Islet and St. James' division of Montreal, Quebec, and West Queen's, Prince Edward Island.

SIR R. R. DOBELL'S FUNERAL. Quebec, Jan. 14.—Out of respect for the memory of the late Hon. Mr. Dobell, a memorial service was held in the Cathedral of the Holy Trinity at Quebec, and was largely attended by representative citizens.

Folkstone, England, Jan. 14.—Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, the high-commissioner for Canada, and Jos. G. Colmer, secretary of the office of the Canadian high commissioner, represented the Canadian Government at the funeral today of Sir Richard Reid Dobell, the Canadian minister, who was thrown from his horse and killed near here on Saturday last. Canon Woodhouse officiated at the services, which were attended by a large number of persons.

The case against the Port Huron and Saratoga Ferry Company, for neglecting to comply with the conditions in the bylaws regulating the running of ferries, that requires a twenty minute service during certain hours of the day was before the judge magistrate at Saratoga the other morning. PUNCHED IN HIS PULPIT.

Sensational Scene in a Church in Detroit.

Warrants Out for Two of Its Members Who Tried to Break Up the Service—The Minister Assaulted.

[Detroit News, Jan. 14.] There was a lively time Sunday evening at the Bethel A. M. E. Church, and as a result of a consultation between Pastor Robert Seymour and the elders, complaints were made this morning for Elmer Johnson and Sam Timbers, members of the congregation, who have been arrested before Justice Sellers on the charge of disturbing religious services.

Rev. Mr. Seymour, the pastor, came down to the police court this morning to take out the complaints. He said that Elmer Johnson has long been a scoffer and a thorn in the side of the church militant, but that Sunday evening he and Timbers came to church and opened a rapid and disturbing fire of irrelevant observations. They started in with comment on the members of the congregation in their immediate vicinity, relative to dress, general appearance, family history, and probable future. They then raised their voices and made some candid statements about the church, with special reference to its administration in the hands of Pastor Seymour, at that moment in deep exhortation in the pulpit. One of the church members came down the aisle and made accusations. It is alleged that Elmer and Sam extended invitations to the pastor which not only could never be accepted by a church member, but which a good deal upon the church and the Sunday school. Then Pastor Seymour addressed Elmer and Sam from the pulpit to attract the attention of the entire congregation in their direction.

But this, it is said, did not phase Elmer and Sam. On the contrary, it is said, they arose in the pulpit, turned their fire of criticism to the person of the pastor.

Elmer, it is alleged, even ascended the steps of the chancel, and released a right-hand swing at Pastor Seymour that had landed, would have left the flock shepherdless for an indefinite period. But the clergyman ducked and sidestepped, and the best Elmer could do was to slap the pastor's cheeks with his finger tips in a highly objectionable manner.

Some members of the congregation then rushed up the aisle to the assistance of their pastor. Elmer and Sam were hustled out of the church.

Mr. Seymour said this morning that he had given Elmer many positions in and out of the church in the effort to reclaim him, but now that he had attacked his holy, his sacred, his church, the pastor's block off, he was going to leave the reforming business to someone who can wallop with both hands.

The request was complied with, and the voting was carried out to the great satisfaction of all present, and with the following result:

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WEDDED AT CAPE TOWN

Gallant Canadian Officer Marries London Woman

Major Duncan Stuart and Miss May Fraser United for Life in Far-Away South Africa.

A dispatch from Cape Town, South Africa, to Mr. Alexander Stuart, K.C., announces the marriage of his brother, Major Duncan Stuart, to Miss May Fraser, daughter of the late Dr. J. M. Fraser, of this city, who sailed for South Africa on Dec. 7.

The ceremony was performed at Rosedale, Cape Town, by Canon Brooks, and Mr. and Mrs. Stuart will visit many of the historic spots and battlefields in Natal and Cape Colony before taking up their residence in Johannesburg.

Both Major and Mrs. Stuart are well known, socially, in this city, the former being known as an able lawyer and public-spirited citizen. Before accepting his commission as captain of B Company, first Canadian contingent, he was a member of the well-known legal firm of Stuart, Stuart & Ross.

The gallant officer commanded the company at Dornkop, where it will be remembered, the Canadians had to rush through the burning veldt, and where the Gordon Highlanders were almost annihilated. Major Stuart experienced most of the hardships which the company went through, and was not present at the actual fight of Paardeberg, but arrived before the regiment left. He witnessed the annexation of the Transvaal to Britain at Pretoria, shortly after which he was sent to England on sick leave. Major Stuart had special attention paid him by Lord Roberts, and when he arrived in England was the guest of King Edward at Sandringham for two weeks.

Major Stuart stayed at the rest of the war when the first contingent left for home, and was in command of the Boer camp at Green Point for six weeks, after which he was appointed receiver of revenue at Johannesburg, and lately was promoted to be assistant registrar of the mining rights of the Transvaal.

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
