USED IN CITY

Superintendent Moore of Water-
works Department Submits
Annual Report.

The annual report of Superintendent
Moore, of the water commission, was
submitted last evening at the meet-
ing of the water commission, and was or-
dered printed in the minutes.

Mr. Moore pointed out that in the
thirty new hydrants had been put
in the summer there was very little
in the dry spell the reservoir was shut
off to insure fire protection.

During the year a conduit had been
built on the land purchased from Mr.
U. A. Buchner, and a considerable
amount of water was added to the
city's supply.

The grounds had been kept in good
order and a number of shade trees had
been planted. The reservoir, dam and
water power were in good repair.

Metres in Use.

There were 101 new metres installed
during the year, and at the present
time there are 377 in use.

The hydraulic power pumps were
operated during the year, as follows:
No. 1 pump, 6,350 hours; No. 2, 5,940
hours; No. 3, 4,188 hours. The Blake-
Yates steam pump was operated 3,026
hours, and the Kelly pump 14 hours.

Thirty new hydrants had been put
in, making 572 hydrants now in use.
This did not include 30 private
hydrants.

During the year the following 6-inch
mains had been laid: Carfrae Crescent,
328 feet; Nelson street, 182 feet; city
hospital, 485 feet; St. George street,
411 feet; Wellington road, 168 feet;
Wortley road, 189 feet; Queen's Park,
881 feet; Edward street, 504 feet; Gor-
don street, 399 feet; Sydenham street,
623 feet; Teresa street, Askin to
avenue south, 159 feet; Weston street,
484 feet; Wolseley street, 675 feet.

Secretary Ellwood submitted his re-
port also, and it was ordered printed in
the minutes.

There was little other business to be
transacted and the year's business was
wound up.

Those present were: Mr. W. Jones,
chairman; Commissioner F. J. Darch,
Mayor Stevely, Engineer Moore and
Secretary Ellwood.

LATE MRS. M. C. CLARK

Mount Bridges Community Loses a
Much-Estimated Resident.

Mount Bridges, Dec. 15.—After a few
days' illness which did not appear
serious enough to greatly alarm the
members of her household, Margaret
C. Dawson, wife of Wm. H. Clark,
died near Mount Bridges, on Friday,
Dec. 12, aged 44 years. Mrs. Clark was
the daughter of Mrs. E. Dawson and the
late John Dawson, of Sylvan. She sur-
vived by her husband, two sons, her
mother, three sisters and one
brother. These are, Wm. H. Clark,
Dawson, London; Kenneth Clark; Mrs. E.
Dawson, London; Wm. Dawson, Park-
hill; Mrs. Geo. Clarke, Crediton; Mrs.
Mauf, Mackay, Sylvan, and Mrs. E. S.
English, London.

The funeral took place on Monday.
The services were conducted in Cook's
Presbyterian Church by Rev. Mr.
Leitch, and was very impressive. Mrs.
Clark had sung in the choir, and her
vacant chair was draped in black, as
was also the coffin. The floral offerings
were very beautiful, and consisted of
the choir; a wreath from the Ladies'
Aid, of which she was secretary-
treasurer, and wreaths and sprays
from relatives and old school friends.
The pallbearers were six of her pupils,
she having taught school for a num-
ber of years in the section where she
lived. Rev. Mr. Leitch spoke feelingly
of the loss the church had sustained,
and made a touching reference to her
children so early bereft of a mother's
care.

Mr. Clark and his two young sons
have the sympathy of the entire com-
munity in their sudden bereavement.

Canon Hague Reviews the Good
Work of Bishops of the Past
and Bishop Williams.

particularly of the brief ministry of the

Rev. Lawrence Skye, rector of St.
Anne's Church, Toronto, gave a prac-
tical address on church work. He
deplored the evil of the club spirit in
the church, where people treat a

worth of their money. This, Mr. Skye
said, is a decidedly wrong attitude,
and far from the example set by
Christ, who sought how much good
he could do for others.

During the evening a programme,
consisting of solos by Miss Mabel
Scarlett, Miss Moore, Mr. J. Doherty;
Duets by Messrs. Smith and Wright,
and a violin solo by Mr. Maurice
Poure, was rendered, and greatly en-
joyed.

The serving of refreshments
brought a most enjoyable evening to
a close.
