377 METERS USED IN CITY
Superintendent Moore of Water-works Department Submits Annual Report.

The annual report of Superintendent Moore, of the water commission, was submitted last evening at the meeting of the water commission, and was ordered printed in the minutes.
Mr. Moore pointed out that in the spring there was plenty of water, but in the summer there was very little. In the dry spell the reservoir was shut off to insure fire protection.
During the year a conduit had been built on the land purchased from Mr. Nelson, and a considerable amount of water was added to the city's supply.
The grounds had been kept in good order and a number of shade trees had been planted. The reservoir dam and water power were in good repair.
Metres in Use.
There were 101 new metres installed during the year, and at the present time there are 377 in use.
The hydraulic power pumps were operated during the year, as follows: No. 1 pump, 6,550 hours; No. 2, 5,940 hours; No. 3, 418 hours. The Blake-Yates steam pump was operated 3,026 hours, and the Kelly pump 14 hours.
The new hydrants had been put in, making 572 hydrants now in use. This did not include 30 private hydrants.
During the year the following 6-inch mains had been laid: Carfrae Crescent, 328 feet; Nelson street, 192 feet; city hospital, 485 feet; St. George street, 411 feet; Wellington road, 168 feet; Wortley road, 189 feet; Queen's Park, 881 feet; Edward street, 504 feet; Gordon street, 309 feet; Sydenham street, 623 feet; Teresa street, Askin to avenue, 306 feet; Teresa street, Byron street, 278 feet; Wolseley street, 678 feet. Secretary Ellwood submitted his report also, and it was ordered printed in the minutes.
There was little other business to be transacted and the year's business was wound up.
