EDDIE MINES' DEAL SPOILED BY POLICE

Crook Well-Known in London
Baffled by Eastern Officers.

The New York Sun contains the following story:
A telegram from the chief of police of Ottawa, Ontario, at 12:10 o'clock yesterday morning asking police protection for a businessman of Ottawa, who was headed for this city with a big bundle of money, and in the company of two men who might have designs on the money.
The man from Ottawa was Joseph Wadsworth. He had \$4,000 in cash, and letters of credit for \$6,000. The telegram said the picture of one of his companions could be found in the rogues' gallery at police headquarters in this country and Europe. The original of the picture was credited with being an artistic wire-tapper and all-around confidence man.
Use all means to protect Mr. Wadsworth from robbery, said the dispatch.

The Confidence Man.

A description of the man was given. The confidence man was said to have a flat nose that made him easily recognizable. The flat nose was found in the gallery, and the records said its proprietor had been arrested often and convicted once of robbery.
Another telegram from Ottawa arrived an hour later saying the men were on the Montreal express, which was due at Grand Central station at 7:30 o'clock yesterday morning.
Detectives Dietrich and Dale met the train. They spotted two men in conversation, one of whom had brought the registered flat nose with him.
"Hello, Mines! Where's the sucker?" Dietrich said to the man.
"Nothing doing, honest," the man responded.

The detectives arrested Mines, first name Edward. They took charge of his companion, who said he was from Hamilton, Canada.
"Sucker" was warned.
Wadsworth was not on the train. Mines said he had got off between Albany and this city after getting off Albany a telegram, which probably told him he was in the hands of confidence men. The detectives searched the prisoners to see if they had \$4,000 or any letters of credit. There was only \$100 between the two.
The prisoners were taken to the Yorkville police court, where Dale told Magistrate Bennett that he didn't expect any complaint to appear. They were then discharged without waiting for Wadsworth to show up. Mines expressed the intention of sailing for Europe this week if he could raise the money without violating the laws of his country.

Well Known in London.

The above-mentioned "Eddie" Mines is well known to the local police. "Mines is supposed to have been concerned in several jobs in this city," said a detective this morning. "We know him well, as he is one of the slickest criminals on the coast. He has been in time in nearly every state prison in the Union, and in many Canadian prisons besides. He must be getting on for 55 or 60 years old. Thirty years ago he was around London a great deal, and was arrested on several occasions. Since then he has been through here at intervals. Hamilton, however, is recognized as his headquarters, and he often stayed there for long periods."

447 CHILDREN IN FOSTER HOMES

Splendid Work of Local
Aid Society.

INSPECTOR SANDERS' INTERESTING ADDRESS

Shows That Energetic Staff Has Had
a Busy Time of It.

The fifteenth annual meeting of the Children's Aid Society was held yesterday afternoon in the city hall, and was attended by a large representation of the members. Sheriff Cameron, president of the society, presided.

In his opening address, he traversed the work done by the society during the year. The number of children under the control of the society was increasing, due largely to the fact that the work of the organization was better understood now than formerly. The society had reached more children than it did formerly, and the wayward, deserted and neglected children were being cared for better than ever before, and were not allowed to develop into criminals and outcasts. While there had been a great improvement in the work done by the society, there was still plenty of room for advancement. He thought that an organized band of workers who would take cognizance of every neglected child would greatly assist the society in its operations.

Annual Report.

The annual report of Inspector Sanders was received. It showed the progress and development of the work. During the year he had inquired into 100 cases of neglect of children by parents and misconduct of children. These had largely been settled without interference from the police. A number of incorrigible children had been placed temporarily in the shelter, and the need of a permanent home for them was being considered. Inspector Sanders stated that the wards of the society in foster homes were doing well, and were as a rule a credit to the society in its operations.

Some Statistics.

Some of the statistics of the society are as follows: Number of children who passed through the society's hands during the year, 112; children in the shelter, 29; wards of the society in charge of Sisters of St. Joseph, 4; returned from foster homes during the year, 22; city children taken in charge during the year, 22; county of Middlesex children taken during the year, 4; returned from other children's aid societies during the year, 26; runaways cared for during the year, 4.

Children Disposed Of.

These children were disposed of as follows: Placed in foster homes for the first time, 32; replaced in foster homes, 18; returned to parents or guardians, 18; returned to Kent County Children's Aid Society, 6; sent to provincial reformatory, 4; committed to the industrial school from city, 1; returned from industrial school, 1; returned from orphan's home, 2; wards in care of Sisters of St. Joseph on Nov. 30, 1908, 2; wards in care of Sisters of St. Joseph on Nov. 30, 1909, 20.

Foster Homes.

The society now has in foster homes 447 children, of whom 232 are girls and 215 are boys. During its lifetime the society has cared for 495 children, 248 of them now being able to care for themselves. Mr. F. M. Thomson, of Brantford, inspector for that city, and the surrounding district, was present, and delivered a very able address on the care of children. His address was highly appreciated.

LATE MRS. C. ARMSTRONG
Passing of Much-Estimated Pioneer of East Nissouri.

In East Nissouri, near Kintore, the death occurred on Feb. 29 of Annie, relict of the late Chris Armstrong, at the home of her son Walter. Deceased was in her 78th year and had been a widow for 30 years. She came to Canada at the age of 15 (or about 65 years ago), with her parents, from Scotland, and resided in East Nissouri ever since. Like most of the old pioneers, Mrs. Armstrong was of a very energetic disposition, and was up for some hours even on the day of her death.

The funeral took place on Tuesday, Feb. 23, at the Kintore cemetery, the services at the house and grave being conducted by Rev. J. Lindsay, of whose church (Presbyterian) deceased had been a member and regular attendant until rendered feeble through continued ill-health. The late Mrs. Armstrong is survived by one daughter, and one son, while two daughters and five sons have "gone before." The sympathy of all is extended to the son, Walter, and daughter, Mrs. McLeod (London), and also to the little grand daughter, Lenora, who waited on and loved her so much.

ALLAN JACKLIN A LONDON MAN

Sentenced to 30 Months in the
Michigan State Prison.

Allan Jacklin, the boy recently sentenced to 30 months in the Jackson State Prison, Michigan, for stealing, was formerly a resident of this city, and was for a time employed by the London Street Railway Company as a conductor.

Last year when the Old Boys' celebration was on Jacklin was in the city and operated a coin-ringing booth on King street. He was arrested in Jackson, Mich., for stealing \$150 worth of jewelry from a family who had taken him in and cared for him.

While on his way to the prison, after being sentenced, Jacklin committed another theft, and was sentenced to 30 months in the Michigan State Prison. The guard for his train in the waiting-room when a traveller came in and bought a ticket. The agent placed the ticket and \$9 in change on the counter. The traveller had turned for an instant to pick up his grip, and Jacklin in some manner secured the money.

A Bad One.
He was one of the most active in the search for the money, and soiled with the traveller most feelingly on the train. As a last resort, the guard searched Jacklin, and money was found in his coat pocket. Why the boy should take the money when he would have absolutely no chance of spending money for three years is a mystery, and the theft was done in such a manner that it was a long time before the money was recovered. Good Canadian.
Major Campbell was born in Middlesex, but for some years lived in California. Later he moved to Montana, and for some time he was secretary to the United States army in that state. Some fifteen years ago he came to London. He has been greatly impressed with the future of this country.

Canadian in his views. He has addressed many gatherings during the past few years especially, and never hesitated to voice his views on the country, and make a plea for the development of a distinctly Canadian nationality. On his return, the rumor was spread that he was an American citizen, and at every election for years he was sworn by the party opposed to him, but he always took his oath, as he was then and had always been a Canadian.

What He Believes In.
However, Major Campbell never advocated the breaking of British connection, nor did he advocate any policy that might tend to weaken the ties existing between the mother land and the colonies.

He did advocate a strong virile distinct type of Canadian manhood, and urged the young men especially to strive to make the Canadian flag greater than any other. But he was never antagonistic to British connection.

There seems no reason why Canada should take a more direct interest in the settlement of her frontier difficulties with the United States.

COMMISSION MAY THROW DOORS OPEN
Police News May Be Had First Hand in the Future.

There will be a meeting of the police commissioners next week, and the estimates for the coming year will be presented by Chief Williams. The estimates are not complete yet, but it is understood that they will not exceed those of last year, when about \$45,000 was asked for, and \$40,000 was spent.

The question of admitting reporters to the meetings will be brought up also by Magistrate Love. "Am going to let that matter settle," he told The Advertiser this afternoon. "I have always been in favor of allowing the newspaper men to attend the meetings. There is not the slightest reason why they should not be admitted. The commissioners are a public body, spending public money, and the public have a perfect right to know what is done. I shall myself move that the newspaper men be admitted."

Mayor Stevely has expressed himself as being favorable to the move. Judge Macbeth, it is expected, will oppose it as he does not think it necessary to have the newspaper men at the meetings.

MOROCCO SHORT OF MONEY.
Tanger, March 9.—It is reported that Mohammed Sidi Mokri, former minister of foreign affairs of Morocco, is going to Paris to arrange with the French government for a new loan of \$2,000,000, which is to be secured by the annual customs receipts. This loan, it is stated, will be applied to the payment of the Casablanca indemnities and other outstanding claims.

APPEAL ALLOWED
A Decision That Favored a London Assinee Is Reversed.

The divisional court at Toronto has given judgment in the action of William Gordon, lumberman, of Stratford, against W. O. Matthews, of London, assinee for the benefit of creditors of Duncan L. Myers, of Stratford, hardware merchant, allowing the appeal from Chief Justice Mulock's decision of Dec. 17, that plaintiff is not entitled to rank on estate of Myers along with Myers' other creditors, for claims totaling \$1,198.60, and dismissing the action with costs.

The court ruled that plaintiff could look to the partnership estate for the debt as contracted by that partnership, or he could look to the estate of D. L.
