MAKING MONEY FAST

Doing as Well as Rockefeller, Says Defrauder of Immigrants.

New York, Sept. 21.—The postoffice inspector made an announced call today in an East Side tenement, and arrested Domenico Forte, a young Italian, and the reputed head of the "European-American Transfer Company," a concern through which it is alleged a petty swindle was conducted by which hundreds of Italians throughout the United States were victimized. Forte, charged with using the mails to defraud, was held in \$1,000 bail.

According to the inspector, letters were sent out by Forte to credulous farmers, complaining that a package of jewelry, consigned to them had been lost. They were told to contact the "European-American Transfer Company," which agent, had paid \$1 95 duty thereon

The package would be forwarded to its destination, the letter said, upon receipt of \$2 95. The scheme worked for complaints have been pouring in on the postoffice department of late. The inspectors say that the names of 10,000 prospective "customers" were found in Forte's rooms. The prisoner made a full confession, it is alleged, saying that he was the sole proprietor and that he was "making money as fast as Rockefeller."

RAN OVER CHILDREN.

Toronto, Sept. 21.—While driving a team at a sharp clip down Cottingham street this morning, Arthur Evans, expressman, dashed into a group of ten little girls on the way to Cottingham Street School. Ethel Rogerson had her left leg and collar-bone broken and Lila Cheyne had her left arm broken, while the other girls were severely cut and bruised. A warrant is out for Evans' arrest.

BOOM! AT COBALT.

Cobalt, Sept. 21.—Building Inspector Holmes issued building permit No. 10 yesterday. When the new inspector assumed his duties a couple of weeks ago, 63 permits had been issued by Inspector Frank Kennedy, leaving a balance of 37 issued by Mr. Moye. In addition, there are about 39 other permits pending. Over 100 new buildings are in course of erection within the town limits at present.

CHARGED WITH FRAUD.

Toronto, Sept. 21.—David Shepherd, about 70 years of age, white-haired and venerable in appearance, and a well-known citizen of Paris, Ont., appeared in the police court this morning to answer the charge of obtaining \$225 from Andrew M. Mintram by false pretences, by means of a worthless check. The case comes out of deal with Mintram for \$1,400 worth of South African veterans' scrip. Hearing was adjourned to the 28th, his being accepted.
