NOT SETTLED YET

Considerable Annoyance Still Exists
Over the Ferry Situation.

Sarnia, Sept. 10.—Large quanti-

ABDUCTION CHARGE
FOR U. S. OFFICIAL

Secretary of Legation at Panama Gets
Into Serious Trouble.

New York, Sept. 10.—Harry E. No-
lan, of Washington, D. C., recently
appointed secretary to the United
States legation at Panama, failed to
appear in police court today to plead
to a charge of abduction of 13-year-
old Marion McVicker, of Newport
News, Va., and his cash bail of \$1,000
was ordered forfeited and two detec-
tives were dispatched to arrest him.

After declaring the \$1,000 bail for-
feited, the court fixed bail at \$2,500 for
Nolan when rearrested, and paroled
the McVicker girl. The arraignment

was then declared postponed until the
17th of September.

Nolan was arrested last night on the
complaint of agents of the Old Domini-
on Steamship Company, that the Mc-
Vicker girl, whose father is reputed to
be a prosperous innkeeper at
Glasgow, Scotland, had disappeared
from the steamer Jefferson shortly af-
ter its arrival here Friday.

The McVicker girl had been intrus-
ted by her brother to the care of the
stewardess of the vessel, with in-
structions to remain aboard until Sat-
urday, when she was to have sailed
for Scotland on a ticket purchased
from the Anchor Line by her father.

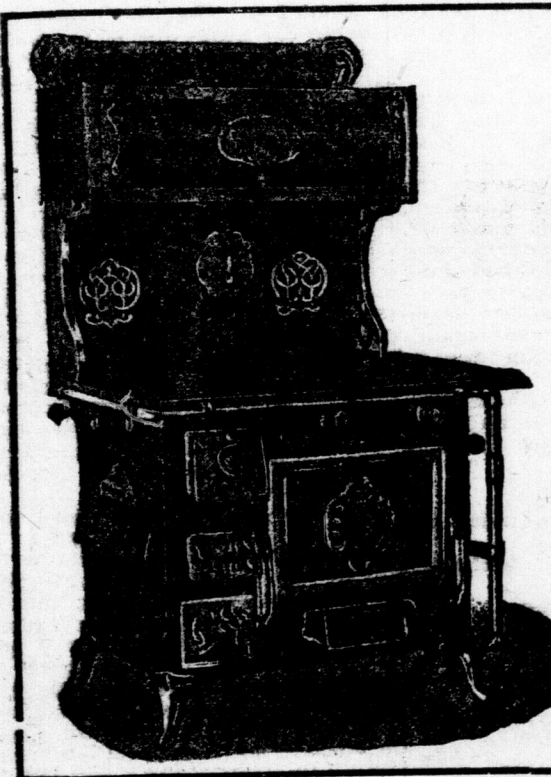
The couple were located at a fash-
ionable Broadway hotel, where they
had registered as H. E. Nolan and
wife. The girl broke down and told
the detectives that she had met Nolan
aboard the vessel, and at his sugges-
tion that she get a position in New
York, had changed her mind about go-
ing back to Scotland and gone with
him. Nolan had nothing to say, and
was held until this morning, when a
lawyer furnished bail for his appear-
ance in court today.

WRECK ON NICKEL PLATE

Two Score Injured in Accident, Near
Erie, Pa.

Erie, Pa., Sept. 10.—There were 28
persons seriously injured when east-
bound train No. 6 of the Nickel Plate
road was derailed this afternoon at
Fagan road, near this city. There
were probably a score of others who
sought relief at the local hotels who
were not badly hurt.

Three prominent railroad men had
narrow escapes from death. The pri-
vate car attached to the rear of the
train carried W. H. Conitt, president
of the road; W. J. Watterson, of Buf-
falo, superintendent of the division,
and President Dunston, of the Fort

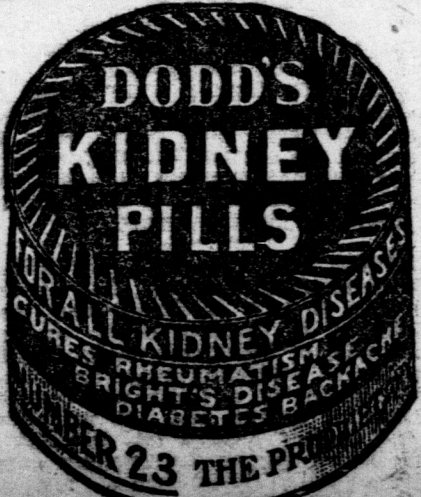
