CANON INDORSED BY SYNOD WILL MAKE SWEEPING CHANGES

New Method of Filling Vacancies Was Supported By Bishop Williams and Passed After a Long and Interesting Debate-Parochial Committee Will in Future Fill Pulpits.

The discussion of a new canon mak-gregations, and were therefore coming sweeping changes in the methods now employed in filling -vacancies and effecting changes among the clergy, occupied the full time of the Anglican Synod yesterday afternoon. The canon which provides that vacant pulpits shall be filled by a parochial committee in conference with the bishop, instead of by a vote of the congregation as has previously been the procedure was hotly contested, and it was not until the closing hour of the session that the debate was terminated and the question put to a vote. The measure, which had the support, of Bishop Williams, was sustained by a substantial majority.

The principal clause of this bew church legislation reads as follows: There shall be in every parish a committee on clerical appointment and exchange, hereinafter called the parochial committee, which shall consist of the lay members of the synod, their substitutes, and the church wardens, and which shall have full power in conference with the bishop to tepresent the parish in the selection of in incumbent, and shall exercise that power without any further reference to or consultation with, the registered veters or with the vestry."


