TORONTO MAY LOSE FEDERAL FRANCHISE

Says Players Have Not Signed The Officials Almost Decide To Switch It Over To Cincinnati.

[Canadian Press.] Cincinnati, Ohio, Jan. 22 .- This city which is the headquarters of organized baseball, inasmuch as the office of the national commission is located here, is denied that the Federals had signed seriously threatened by an invasion of the Federal League. At a secret meeting held last night in the office of a law firm it was almost finally decided to switch the franchise of the Toronto Federal League Club to Cincinnati. Present at the meeting were President James A. Gilmore, of the Federal league; Joseph Dixon, president of the

newly-organized City League, and Paul Connelly, an attorney. Dixon, who is prominent in amateur sports, particularly baseball, outlined the local situation to Gilmore and Gates.
