FLAMES CAUSE LOSS OF \$50,000

Fire Destroys Building Recently Occupied by International Creameries, Limited.

Blaze Gains Great Headway Before Firemen Reach Scene.

Damage estimated in the neighborhood of \$50,000 was done by a fire which gutted the building recently occupied by the International Creameries, Ltd., and formerly by the Dominion Abattoir, on the suburbs of London, just northeast of

Although workmen who were in the vicinity turned in an alarm when the blaze was small, the building was a furnace of flame when the firemen arrived, with such rapidity did the fire gain headway. The nearest source of water supply was 2,400 feet away in Pottersburg. By the time the water had passed through this long line of hose, the pressure was low, seriously impeding the firemen in their fight. However, the department was able to save part of the building on the east side, but the main portion was a total loss, the roof having fallen and the walls collapsed early in the afternoon.

The alarm was turned in at 2:35 o'clock, and the blaze had been placed under control a few hours later Firemen were left on duty at the ruins until hours later, for the fire smoldered well into the night.

The building was of brick construction, 3 stories high, situated on the St. Marys branch of the G. T R. and well isolated. It is owned by A. B. Greer of London.

Men From Sinking Tug In St. Clair River.

Special to London Advertiser. CARNIA, Oct. 25.—Two men. whose names could not be learned, were rescued late Tuesday in the St. Clair River flats district, below Algonac, by the crew of the steamer Wilpen, when a small tug, which hailed from Wallaceburg and manned by the two men, who also reside at that town, sank.

Signals of distress from the tug were seen by the crew of the Wilpen, which was upbound, and the two men were taken off a few minutes before the small tug went to the bot-

The tug, which was used in the fishing business, sprung a leak and was going down fast when the rescue was effected. The men were put ashore at Marine City and went to their homes at Wallaceburg without giving their names. A report of the rescue was made at Marine City by the captain of the steamer Wilpen. It is believed that the tug will be a menace to navigation, but an investigation will be made by American officials to determine the location of the wreck.

REDS CAPTURE

Japs Turn Over Stores to Troops From Siberia.
