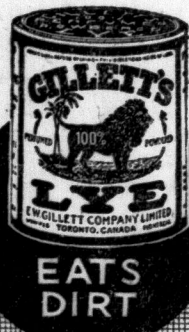

ADVISES PERMITS FOR AMERICANS FISHING IN CANADA

W. Smith, Honorary Head of Game Protective Association, Asks License System.

ATTACKS MONOPOLY Says Society Instrumental In Abolishing Nets From Inland Streams.

During the last quarter of a century the Western Ontario Fish and Game Protective Association has worked wonders to safeguard against extermination the inhabitants of the water and forests. This fact is not generally realized by the people in the province, but the three or four hundred citizens who gathered in the Catholic Club Auditorium last night for the free educational entertainment by the association were convinced of it before the evening was far advanced.

Four motion pictures, showing various Canadian industries and beauty spots of the Dominion were presented, and these, together with a variety of vocal and musical selections made up a program well worth attending. Mayor Wenig, who was chairman of the evening, received a great ovation when he mounted the platform, and he commended the association for the splendid work it has accomplished during its existence. The mayor had to leave early, and his remarks that things were extremely busy in civic circles during the past two weeks brought forth a rippling laugh from here and there in the audience.

Accounts History. William Smith, honorary president of the Western Ontario Fish and Game Association, reviewed the history of the club since its inception 25 years ago. To illustrate the good the organization has done to protect fish and game in this province, he stated that at present no nets are allowed on inland streams. The monopoly of fishing by a few through the use of nets was one of the greatest evils the association had to deal with, he asserted, but after years of efforts they were rewarded by having this form of being curtailed.

He stated, however, that he thought it all right for farmers to use dip nets on streams running through their own property, saying that the average farmer was not the kind to abuse this privilege. "The fish and streams in Ontario belong to the people," he declared at one time in his address. "The government might think they own them, but they do not. They think a lot of things, sometimes, when they get down to Toronto."

Favors License. The speaker also declared himself in favor of American tourists coming into Canada to fish having to pay for a license, pointing out that the American authorities are vigilant in this regard, and it is not very long when a Canadian begins to fish in United States waters before he is made buy a license. Other speakers of the evening were President William Nutkins, and Messrs. Dickenson, Myers and Holmes. Vocal selections from the Harmonic and Silvertones Quartets were greatly appreciated and the singers forced to respond to encores. The Vita Orchestra also delighted with several selections.

YOUNG GALT CHINAMAN IN COURT FOR ASSAULT

Galt, April 27.—George Wong, a 15-year chinaman was found guilty by Magistrate Blake at Preston of assault causing actual bodily harm to Edward McKeown, of Preston, and only his age saved him from a jail term. He was made a ward of the Children's Aid Society and will be removed from Preston and probably deported.

The assault took place in a Preston cafe Good Friday night in the course of which McKeown received a nasty gash in the wrist from a knife, as a result of which he was forced to go to the Galt Hospital.

MAKES BITTER ATTACK ON CATHOLIC CHURCH

J. J. Maloney Delivers Address To Large Audience Last Night.

J. J. Maloney, who claims himself a one-time Roman Catholic priest, delivered a scathing address against the Church of Rome in the Masonic Temple here last night. He spoke in no uncertain terms concerning the tenets and catechism of Rome and claimed that the Roman Catholic interpretation of the scriptures is both warped and inconsistent.

He claimed among other things that the "Ne temere" decree of the Pope can be taken as absolute proof of the fact that in their hearts Catholics admit of no sovereign save the Pope and it was largely on the grounds that this stand of the Catholic Church would, if allowed, undermine our empire, that he claimed the right to expose the policy of Rome as opposed to our rights as citizens. In speaking of the purgatory which figures in the Catholic faith he said that it was invented in the twelfth century and was not part of the original doctrine of the Roman church. He was merely an added feature in the policy of fear, superstition and terrorism which the church used to extort funds from its adherents, he declared.

Interment took place at Mars Hill cemetery.

The late Mr. Amos was a valued member of the Brinsley Church choir and his funeral was one of the largest that McGillivray township has ever seen.

Ingersoll, April 27.—Announcement today of the death of Mrs. M. J. Morrison which occurred at the family residence, King street east, occasioned profound regret among a wide circle of friends. 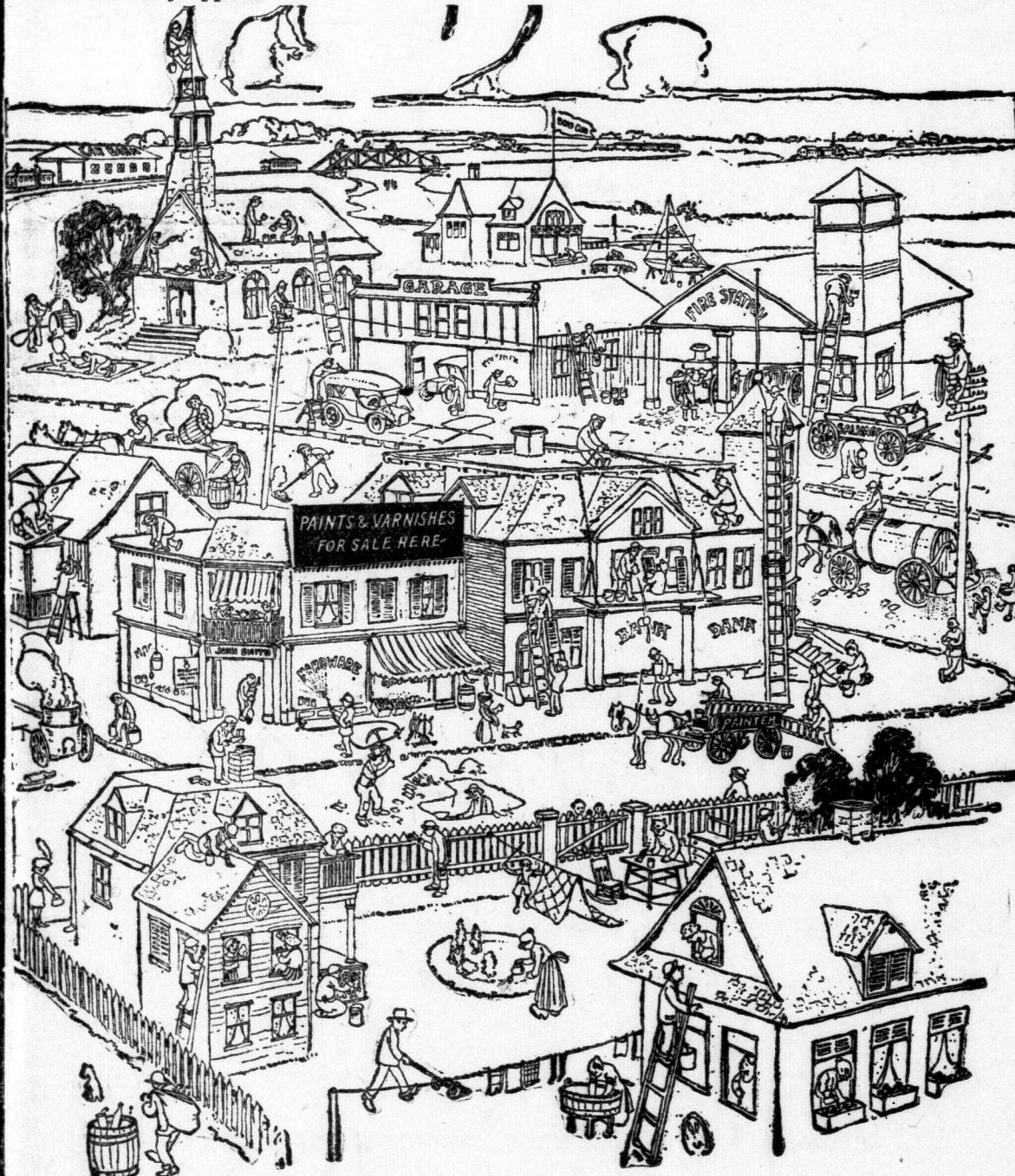
