



British Warship Prevented Imposition on a Weaker Country. Yerkes Gets Control of Brompton-Pic-cadilly Project.

On a Weaker Country. Constantinople, Sept. 5.—The Turkish ambassador in London has been in-structed to inform Great Britain that the action of the commander of a Brit-ish warship in the Persian Gulf in pre-venting the Turkish corvette Schob from entering Koweyt is incompatible with friendly relations. The British side of the controversy is that the Se-hob was trying to land Turkish troops on the territory of a Sheikh, who is independent of Turkey.
