West Coast Development.—At San Juan, West Coast of this island, the business outlook is very promising, especially from a logging standpoint. F. V. Hobbs, who arrived on the Queen City, says this industry is progressing splendidly, and has increased to a considerable extent during the past few months. Another company was recently organized, and, having purchased about 160 acres of land, is busy clearing it of valuable timber. Mining is not going ahead any more than usual, there having been no properties or importance openes up lately. Mr. Hobbs expects that there will be a large party of students from the Minnesota University out to take a course of study at the Port Renfrew station during the summer.

The Pulp Mill.—J. A. Moore, of the Moore Investment Co., Seattle, has become interested in the proposed pulp works on the north end of Vancouver island. It is stated that representatives of the company, accompanied by a hydraulic engineer, will leave here on the next sailing of the steamer Queen City for Quatsino sound. The engineer will look over the water power available for the pulp mill, and will suggest plans for its utilization. A survey of the timber lands will be made at once, and if plans materialize as now anticipated, 500 men will be employed in the works before the end of the year. It is proposed to erect a sawmill with a capacity of 50,000 feet of humber a day. This will be built first. Then the pulp mill will be constructed. All will be dinished by the end of December next.

Line to Mexico.—Very great interest has been aroused locally over the announcement from Ottawa that the government has determined to subsidize a line of steamships between Canada and Mexico. That the line will be on the Pacific seems to be generally conceded, and a strong effort will be made to have Victoria's claims as a terminal point properly emphasized at Ottawa. Mining is flourishing in Mexico, but farming and ranching are in a bad way. W. H. Crosfield, of Vancouver, who has spent several months at Ensenada, Mexico, is at the Balmoral. Mr. Crosfield says that the continued drought in the country is having a depressing effect upon the ranchers, and many seriously consider quitting the country.
