GOVERNMENT HAS MAJORITY OF 45

Three-Eighths of Canadian Children Die Before the Age of 5

Ottawa, Nov. 29.—The first discussion in the new parliament, carried by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, a amendment to the speech from the throne, gave Premier Borden a majority of 44. Adding the member for Yukon, Thompson, who has not yet taken his seat, the government has a majority of 45 out of the whole House.

The vote stood 121 Conservatives, to 77 Liberals. Thus 193 members voted taking the speaker and Thompson into consideration, we have 300 members. There were 9 pairs or 18 members, 2 members, Laurier and Forget have two constituencies each. Girard, member for Chicoutimi Saguenay, who occupied a peculiar position was not present, and the whips did not trouble themselves about him. Thus there was only one member entitled to vote unaccounted for.

W. S. Loggie made a speech in favor of reciprocity.

In the Senate, Senator Belcourt introduced a bill respecting the pollution of streams. He stated that it was his bill of last season and gave the government authority to make regulations to prevent the dumping of untreated sewage into navigable streams. The bill gave the government power to deal with communities separately.

Sir Richard Scott said it was nearly time that laws were made and precautions taken. The census figures showed that 81,000 persons were born in Canada in the year 1901. With the air, sunshine and water, Canada should be the healthiest country in the world and yet of these 81,000 persons, 21,838, or more than a quarter of them, died before coming to a year old and 10,109 died within the next four years, making 31,947 or over three-eighths died within the first five years after birth.

Most of the children who died under the age of three were murdered through the ignorant administration of deadly soothing syrups which were freely sold by every drug store in the country.

"The exhibit of New Brunswick apples at the recent fruit show in Toronto out classed the Ontario exhibits in respect to their richness of color and luster," said A. G. Turvey, provincial horticulturist, in St. John last week.

"In my opinion, too, many of the exhibits at the Toronto show were not as well packed as the exhibits at the show in St. John this fall," he added.

The fruit show which was intended to hold at Ottawa in November, has been postponed till February. The Provincial Department of Agriculture had planned to send an exhibit of New Brunswick fruit to this show. Mr. Turvey will attend the convention of Fruit Growers of Quebec next week and deliver two addresses before the students of the MacDonald Agricultural College. The subject of his address will be the development and possibilities of fruit growing in New Brunswick.

THE ONTARIO ELECTIONS

Monday was Nomination Day in Ontario. Out of 98 seats, 16 went to the Conservative Government by acclamation, while in some 15 other constituencies, Socialists or Independent Laborites, not the Liberals, form the opposition ticket. In Carleton an independent Conservative is running, and in South Waterloo three parties—Conservatives, Liberals and Socialists—are in the field. The election is to be held on Dec. 11th.

RECIPROCITY A DEAD ISSUE

Premier Borden Will Consult British Admiralty on Canad'n Naval Policy.

Ottawa, Nov. 29.—In the Commons to-day Hon. Mr. White, Minister of Finance, said he believed reciprocity is an absolutely dead issue, and he was surprised that gentlemen opposite continue to discuss it. He believed that the Liberals are sorry that reciprocity was ever born. It was rejected on both national and economic grounds, and the decision against it was not the result of an appeal to passion. The farmers, manufacturers and artisans were against it. There were no differences in the government. There had not yet been time to formulate a naval policy. Premier Borden proposed to consult the British Admiralty, and after the conference a naval policy would be brought down which he believed would have the support of both Canada and Britain.
