Washington, Dec. 8.—Among the bills introduced to the senate yesterday was one by Mr. Hale, to increase the navy establishment by the addition of a first class sea going coast line battle ship, at a cost not exceeding \$3,750,000; six sea going torpedo boats of 150 tons displacement, at a cost of \$1,125,000; 3 torpedo boats of greater speed, \$900,000. It is provided that the battle ship shall be primarily for coast defence, and that it shall carry the heaviest armor and the most powerful ordnance, and that it shall have a displacement of 11,500 tons.

Apple Famine in Ottawa.

Ottawa, Dec, 13 —Canadian fruit dealers are shipping to the old country their best fruit when the same cannot be obtained for or money in the domestic market. It is at present a sheer impossibility to buy good Snow apples. There is not a barrel to be bought in Ottawa such as would be looked upon as first class for table use in other years. Prices are high, too, and many families would give even an exorbitant figure to get what they want. Mr. Robertson, Agricultural Commissioner, said in explanation that prices are even higher for apples at present in Great Britain than they are in Canada. Seven dollars a barrel is a good average price in the British market this fall, and as long as this holds out it will pay Canadian apple dealers better to ship to the old country than to sell in Canada.
