FOR NEW HOSPITAL.

Site Secured in Truro And Canvass For Balance Needed to Begin.

Truro.—At a special meeting of the Colchester Hospital Trust, here Tuesday night, the plan of the trustees to purchase a lot of land on West Prince street, for a site for a new brick hospital, was endorsed. The lot is part of the property of L. M. Ellis, and is situated west of his residence and next the athletic grounds, almost across the street from the present hospital. The price agreed upon is a little less than \$3,000. "The lot is .280 feet wide and 435 feet deep."

It is understood that it is planned to use the present hospital, a home for the nurses.

The trust is endeavoring to raise \$45,000; already \$30,000 has been raised in Truro, and the county of Colchester is being canvassed for the remaining \$15,000.
