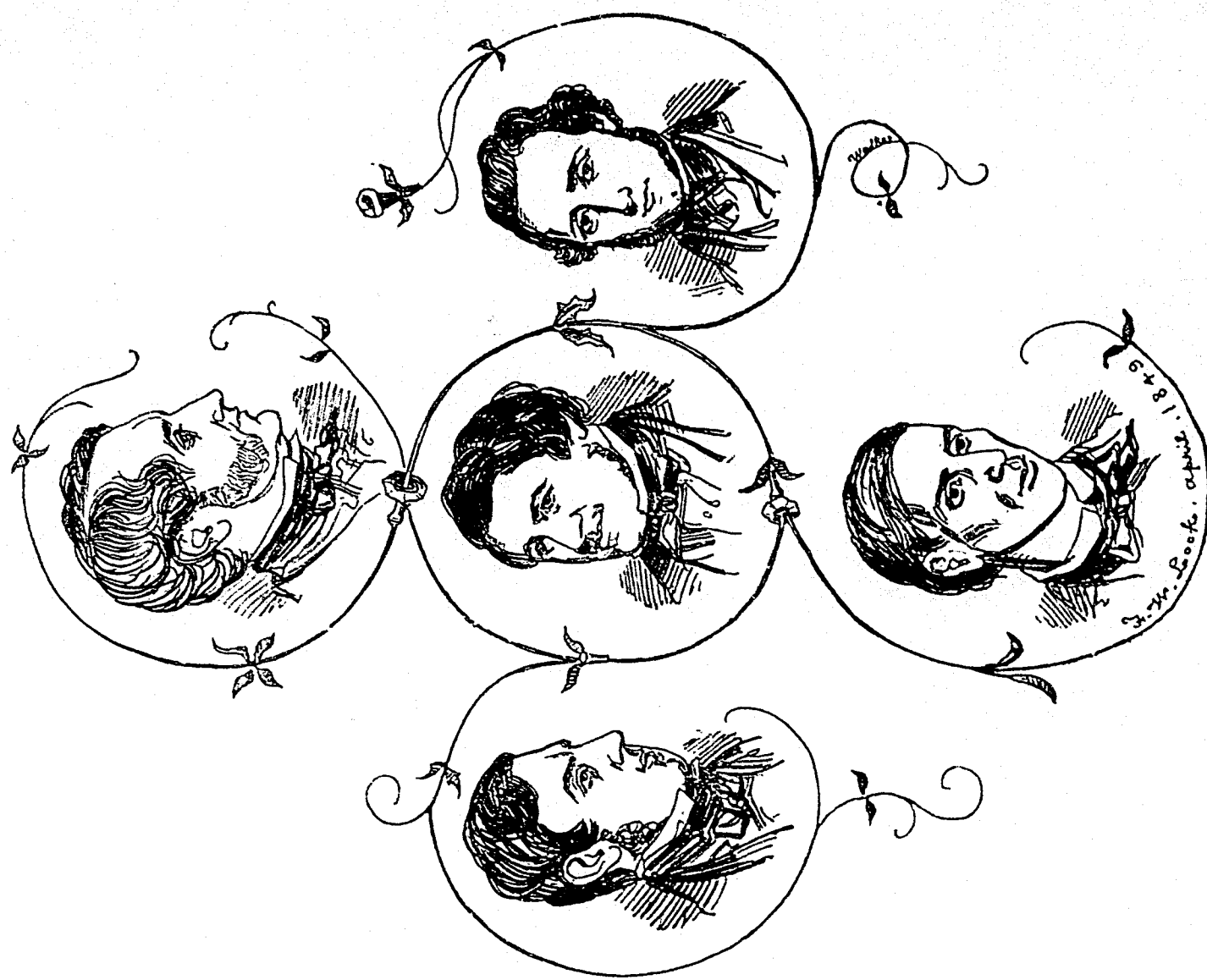


PORTRAITS OF FIVE GENTLEMEN

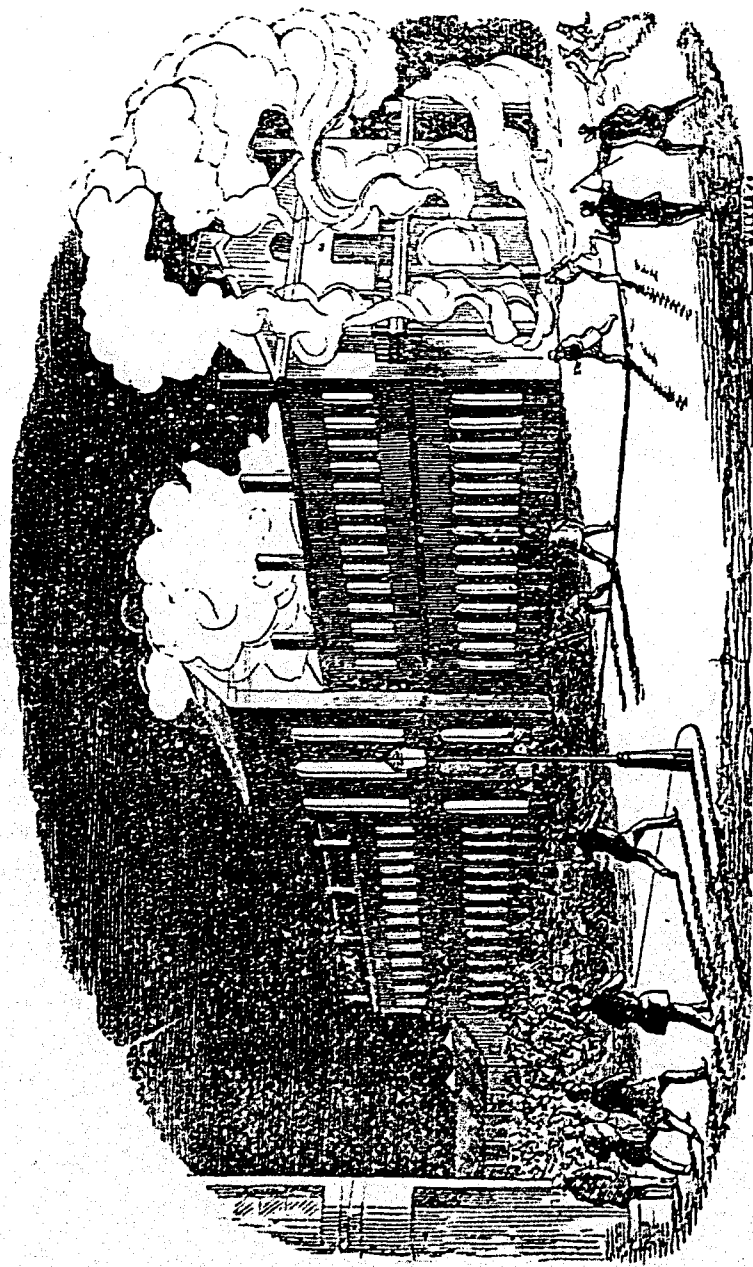

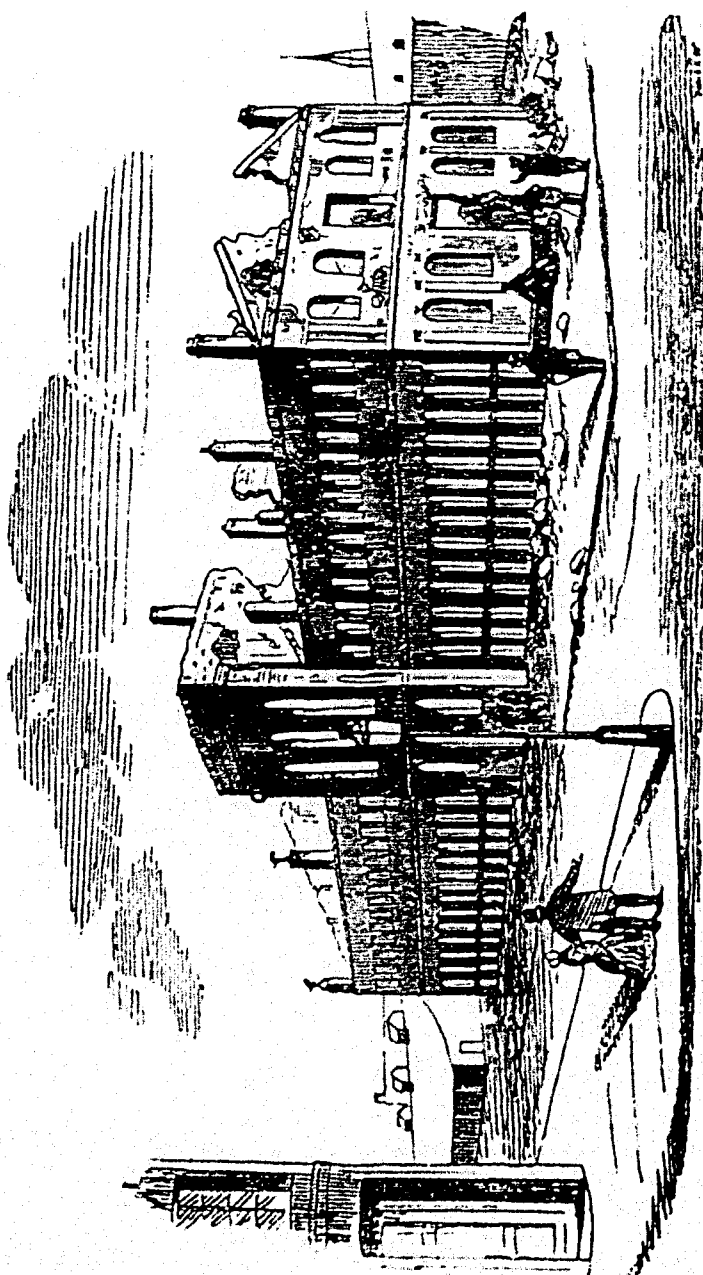
