Mr. Samuel Morley, M.P., says : "I am a Total Abstainer, and have been so for more than a quarter of a century, but I yield to no man in my admiration of the wise and judi-cious working of the C.E.T.S. We may not assent to its plans in every detail, but we can and do heartily recognize that it occupies a field which no other organization could."






