EXCHANGE OF NOTES BETWEEN THE GOVERNMENT OF CANADA AND THE GOVERNMENT OF THE POLISH PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC AMENDING THE LONG TERM WHEAT AGREEMENT OF JULY 26, 1966

DEAR DR. KARCZMAR:

I refer to the Long Term Wheat Agreement between Canada and the Polish People's Republic of 26 July, 1966,⁽¹⁾ and to discussions which have taken place between representatives of our two Governments as well as between representatives of the Canadian Wheat Board and Rolimpex concerning certain difficulties which have arisen in implementing the terms of this Agreement. As a result of these difficulties there remains to be purchased and delivered, as of September 15, 1969, 400 thousand metric tons of Canadian wheat, five per cent more or less.

Following upon these discussions, I wish to propose that the Long Term Wheat Agreement be amended in the following respects:

- (1) The period for completion of the Long Term Wheat Agreement shall be extended until July 31, 1971, on the understanding that Rolimpex will purchase and take delivery of approximately 200,000 tons during the period from September 15, 1969, to July 31, 1970, and the remaining quantity by July 31, 1971.
- (2) At the option of Rolimpex, the Canadian Wheat Board will deliver, under the terms of the Long Term Wheat Agreement, Canadian barley up to 50% of the quantities to be purchased and delivered in the periods ending July 31, 1970, and July 31, 1971, in accordance with paragraph numbered (1).

I would propose that, if the foregoing is acceptable to your Government, this letter which is authentic in English and French, and your reply to that effect shall constitute an Agreement between our two Governments to amend the Long Term Wheat Agreement of July 26, 1966, which shall enter into force on the date of your reply and shall take effect from September 15, 1969.
